ORIENTATION AND TRAINING AND REGULAR MEETING OF THE IDAHO TRANSPORTATION BOARD

November 20-21, 2019

The Idaho Transportation Board met at 2:00 PM on Wednesday, November 20, 2019 at the Idaho Transportation Department in Boise, Idaho. The following principals were present:

The Board participated in training and orientation sessions on the Board's authority as outlined in Idaho Code and the Division of Purchasing's increased delegated authority of \$100,000 to procure goods and services. The Board also discussed the joint meeting with the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council (LHTAC) next month, the annual District tours, and interaction with advisory boards.

WHEREUPON, the training and orientation sessions ended at 4:50 PM.

November 21, 2019

The Idaho Transportation Board convened at 8:00 AM on Thursday, November 21, 2019 at the Idaho Transportation Department in Boise, Idaho. All members were present except Member DeLorenzo.

<u>Executive Session on Personnel and Legal Issues</u>. Member Vassar made a motion to meet in executive session at 8:00 AM to discuss personnel issues as authorized in Idaho Code Section 74-206 (b) and legal issues as authorized in Idaho Code Section 74-206 (f). Member Horsch seconded the motion and it passed 5-0 by individual roll call vote.

The discussion on legal matters related to operations. Member DeLorenzo joined the meeting during that discussion. The discussions on personnel matters related to the performance of employees.

The Board came out of executive session at 9:25 AM.

<u>Safety Share</u>. Emergency Preparedness Coordinator Neal Murphy explained the procedures in case of an emergency during the meeting, and the importance of situational awareness, such as identifying the nearest exit, so you can react appropriately in an emergency.

<u>Board Minutes</u>. Member Horsch made a motion to approve the minutes of the regular Board meeting held on October 17, 2019 as submitted. Member Vassar seconded the motion and it passed unopposed.

<u>Board Meeting Dates</u>. The following meeting dates and locations were scheduled: December 12, 2019 – Boise January 22, 2020 – Boise February 19, 2020 – Boise

<u>Consent Items</u>. Member Vassar made a motion, seconded by Member DeLorenzo, and passed unopposed, to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, consent calendar items are to be routine, non-controversial, self-ITB19-38 explanatory items that can be approved in one motion; and

WHEREAS, Idaho Transportation Board members have the prerogative to remove items from the consent calendar for questions or discussion.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board approves the certification of receipts and disbursements; the FY19 Annual Report; the addition of the Competitive Highway Bridge Program grant for eight bridge projects in FY21; the addition of the Midland Boulevard Railroad Crossing, Nampa project; and a consultant agreement.

- 1) Certification of Receipts and Disbursements. The FY19 certification of receipts and disbursements cash basis, as shown as Exhibit #517, which is made a part hereof with like effect, was submitted for Board approval in conformance with the requirements of Section 40-708, Idaho Code. Total receipts were \$746,935,400, disbursements were \$752,148,200, and the cash balance as of June 30, 2019 was \$76,456,200.
- 2) FY19Annual Report. The FY19 Annual Report, which is required by Idaho Code, reports on the financial condition and management of the Department.
- 3) Add Competitive Highway Bridge Program (CHBP) Grant for Eight Bridge Projects in FY21. In August, the U.S. Department of Transportation awarded Idaho a CHBP grant. The \$6,289,000 award is to replace eight local bridges, support the economy, and improve the connectivity of local roads in southern Idaho. The total cost of the projects is \$8,287,827. The additional funding will come from other federal aid, local jurisdictions, and LHTAC. Staff requests approval to add the South 4th Avenue, Indian Creek Bridge, Caldwell; North Fork Boulder Creek Bridge, Owyhee County; Little Wood River Bridge, Shoshone Highway District; 4200 North Road, Deep Creek Bridge, Buhl Highway District; West Carson Street, Portneuf River Bridge, Pocatello; St. Charles Creek Bridge, Bear Lake County; East 121st Street, Idaho

Canal Bridge, Bonneville County; and South Higbee Drive, Butte Arm Canal Bridge, Idaho Falls to FY21 in the amount of \$8,287,827.

- 4) Add Midland Boulevard Railroad Crossing Nampa to FY20. The scope of the Midland Boulevard Railroad Crossing project, key #22034, is to install a center/median barrier on Midland Boulevard at the active railroad crossing. Curbing will be installed to serve as an additional safety feature to deter motorists from driving around lowered gates. Staff requests approval of the addition of STC-8233, Midland Boulevard Railroad Crossing, Nampa to FY20 in the amount of \$70,000.
- 5) Request to Approve Consultant Agreement. In accordance with Board Policy 4001 Authority to Sign Contracts, Agreements, and Grants and Requirement to Report Certain Contracts, staff requests approval to exceed the \$1 million agreement limit for key #22154 I-84, Ustick and Middleton Road Overpasses, Canyon County, District 3 for construction engineering and inspection services of approximately \$1.6 million.

<u>Information Items</u>. 1) Contract Awards and Advertisements. Key #19188 – I-90, Pennsylvania Avenue Overpass, East Bound Coeur d'Alene, District 1. Low bidder: N A Degerstrom Inc. - \$6,476,215.

Key #19851 – SH-6, Benewah County Line to Santa Junction, District 1. Low bidder: Central Washington Asphalt Inc. – \$727,727.

Key #20115 – FY21 District 5 Revegetation. Low bidder: Snake River Reclamation LLC - \$106,560.

Key #19404 – SH-75, Four Mile Bridge over Big Wood River, District 4. Low bidder: Cannon Builders Inc. - \$2,236,032.

Key #21805 – I-84, FY21 District 4 Rest Area Seal Coats. Low bidder: Emery Inc. - \$319,242.

Key #20048 – FY21 Americans with Disabilities Act Improvements. Low bidder: LaRiviere Inc. - \$376,566.

The list of projects currently being advertised was provided.

- 2) Professional Services Agreements and Term Agreement Work Tasks Report. From September 27 through October 31, 19 new professional services agreements and work tasks were processed, totaling \$3,030,276. Six supplemental agreements to existing professional services agreements were processed during this period in the amount of \$438,733.
- 3) Annual Report on Rail-Highway Crossing Program. ITD receives \$250,000 annually from the State Railroad Grade Crossing Protection Fund for projects in the Rail-Highway Crossing Program. The goal of the program is to reduce the number and severity of vehicle-train collisions at public rail-highway crossings. The Fund also provides \$25,000 to support public

education and safety programs that promote awareness of public safety at railroad grade crossings. The five-year fatality rate at railway-highway crossings for 2014-2018 was 1.6.

5) State FY20 Financial Statements through September. Revenues to the State Highway Account from all state sources were ahead of projections by 5.6%. Receipts from the Highway Distribution Account were 4.2% or \$2.3 million more than forecast. State revenues to the State Aeronautics Fund were ahead of projections by 16%, or \$145,000. Expenditures were within planned budgets. Personnel costs had savings of \$2.9 million or 9.3% due to reserves for horizontal career path increases, vacancies, and timing between a position becoming vacant and being filled. Contract construction cash expenditures of \$174.8 million exceeded any from the past three years.

These funds are obligated against construction projects and encumbrances. The total of the long term investments and the cash balance of \$39.8 million is \$36 million less than the end of June. Expenditures in the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund were \$8.5 million. Deposits into the Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund were \$4.7 million year-to-date.

- 6) Monthly Reporting of Federal Formula Program Funding through October. Idaho received obligation authority through November 21 via a continuing resolution of \$44.2 million, which corresponds to \$44.3 million with match after a reduction for prorated indirect costs. This includes \$936,200 of Highway Infrastructure General Funds carried over from last year in the Transportation Management Area. Idaho has received apportionments via notices through October 1, 2019 of \$315.7 million, including the carryover of \$936,200 of Highway Infrastructure General Funds. Obligation authority is currently 14% of apportionments. Of the \$44.3 million allotted, \$25.6 million remains.
- 7) Status: FY21 Appropriation Request. A number of revisions to the FY21 appropriation request have been made: moved the \$25,000 annual payment to the Department of Commerce for the Gateway Visitors Center to a line item; removed the \$955,200 Information Technology Service Management line item; updated compensation rates for full-time equivalent positions in the Division of Motor Vehicles by \$1,200; updated Statewide Cost Allocation by \$75,700; eliminated the \$12,500,000 District 4 Office Building line item; increased the construction line item \$12,500,000 due to the removal of the District 4 Office Building, \$29,232,800 due to various grants and other projected revenue, and \$3,255,200 for the removal of change in employee compensation reserve and the Information Technology Service Management line item. The revised appropriation request is \$785,460,100.
- 8) Non-Construction Professional Service Contracts Issued by Business and Support Management (BSM). The BSM Section did not execute any professional service agreements during the previous month.

<u>Board Subcommittee on Adjustments to the State Highway System Report.</u> Vice Chairman Kempton said the referenced subcommittee met yesterday. It directed District 6 to negotiate with Madison County on the relinquishment of a portion of SH-33 within Sugar City's

city limits and on the Farm/Field Road, which was established to address access issues due to the construction of the US-20 Thornton Interchange and the closure of at-grade crossings.

Vice Chairman Kempton also said the Subcommittee reviewed revisions to Board Policy 4061 State Highway System Adjustments. The proposal changes the Subcommittee to three members with one member designated as a "floater". The "floater" would step down when there is a system adjustment under consideration in a non-Subcommittee member's District. The intent is to ensure the District with a route on the agenda is represented by his/her Board member. Vice Chairman Kempton added that he is the current chairman of the Subcommittee, Member Hoff is the permanent member, and Member Thompson will be the "floating" member. The policy will be presented for the Board's consideration next month.

Member Horsch added that the Subcommittee on 129,000 Pound Truck Routes has a similar issue and its membership needs to be revisited.

<u>Director's Monthly Report on Activities</u>. Director Ness reviewed the past ten years, noting he was hired as ITD's director on November 19, 2009. He summarized his philosophy that government agencies should serve its citizens, not itself and the best decisions are made closest to the work. He highlighted activities over the years and emphasized the focus on the mission of your safety, your mobility, and your economic opportunity and efforts to ensure employees know how their job ties to the mission; customer service; looking for ways to say yes if possible; and innovations. He also commended the employees, noting the Department's numerous successes the past decade would not have been possible without their efforts.

The Board congratulated Director Ness on his ten years of service and thanked him for his leadership.

Annual Dealer Advisory Board (DAB) Report. DAB Chairman Grant Petersen said there are 1,496 active automobile, boat, recreational vehicle, motorcycle, and specialty vehicle dealers and manufacturers in the state, and they reported \$3.5 billion in sales in 2018. The DAB is concerned with unlicensed individuals selling more than six vehicles annually. Almost 400 unlicensed dealers were identified, resulting in the loss of revenue to licensed dealers and presumably lost tax revenue to the state. He commended the effort to privatize titles, which has improved the turnaround time, quality, communication, and dealer support. Plans are to release an innovative technology dealer portal in spring. The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration is now allowing for electronic records, which is something Idaho needs to pursue. In closing, DAB Chairman Petersen said there is over \$2 million in the Idaho Consumer Asset Recovery Fund. The first claim was paid out of that fund earlier this month.

Chairman Moad thanked DAB Chairman Petersen for the report and his service.

Economic Hardship Permit Applications. Motor Vehicle Program Supervisor (MVPS) Craig Roberts said an administrative rule requires the Board to review and act on permit applications for economic hardships. These commercial motor vehicles exceed the required restrictions on designated routes. The applications are for emergencies and/or economic hardships. He requested approval for permits to haul cattle on an approximate four-mile section

of SH-52 near Emmett in District 3. Without the hardship permit, the rancher would have to find a different means of transporting the cattle. District 3 evaluated the route for factors such as line of sight, road curvature, traffic volume, and accident data, and supports approving the permits.

Chairman Moad noted the permit is to operate on about four miles of SH-52. He does not believe there are any curves on that section that create off-tracking issues. He asked if the Extra Length/Excess Weight up to 129,000 Pounds map could be changed to indicate that portion is a red route, allowing the operation of 53-foot trailers. MVPS Robert said he believes that change could be made if the District's evaluation concurs with that assessment. He added that conditions may be imposed, such as a requirement to use a pilot car.

In response to additional questions, MVPS Roberts replied that routes are evaluated when the Department receives permit applications, and the off-tracking map is updated as needed. He added that staff is looking at ways to improve that update process.

Chief Deputy Stokes asked if the requested section of SH-52, milepost 7.5 to 11.33 has a curve or some restriction for 53-foot trailers. District 3 Engineer Amy Revis said there are no concerns with that segment of highway. Staff will evaluate the route and determine if additional mileage allowing for 53-foot trailers could be added to the map or, if there are restrictions, determine if changes could be made to the highway to allow the longer combination vehicles.

Member DeLorenzo asked how long the haulers would utilize the permits. Chairman Moad believes the haulers are typically done moving cattle in January; however, the request is for an annual permit, so the truckers would need permits in spring to haul the cattle back. He asked if the permit could be issued for a shorter period now and then have staff evaluate the route before spring. Staff said that proposal was feasible.

Member DeLorenzo made a motion, seconded by Member Vassar, and passed unopposed, to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Board has authority to approve requested economic hardship petitions; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department has collected and presented said petitions for travel on SH-52 from milepost 7.5 to milepost 11.33 to the Board; and

WHEREAS, these existing rules or limitations do result in an economic hardship.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board approves the economic hardship petitions submitted for approval on SH-52, milepost 7.5 to milepost 11.33 effective until January 31, 2020.

<u>Human Resources Annual Report</u>. Chief Human Resources Officer (CHRO) Brenda Williams summarized the division's strategic goals, including attracting the best candidates for employment, developing ITD as an ideal workplace, continually developing employees, and promoting employee safety. Staff reported on highlights from FY19. Including internal

promotions and transfers, 315 positions were filled; 154 employees left, including 48 due to retirement; and voluntary separations were 4% while the state as a whole experienced voluntary separations of 7.9%. A concerted effort is being made to survey employees that leave ITD and also interview employees intending to stay with the Department. This data will help establish an ideal workplace. New programs to develop leaders and train equipment operators were developed. The Department partnered with the construction industry to standardize training and help contractors find skilled employees. A critical incident stress management program was also established to provide assistance to employees dealing with stressful situations because maintenance employees are often the first ones to respond to vehicle crashes.

Vice Chairman Kempton asked for more information on the recruiting process and the additional positions the Department acquired. CHRO Williams said ITD generally experiences a vacancy rate of 90 to 100 positions because of turnover and the process to fill positions. Because 20 additional positions were approved, staff will be able to hire employees faster. This should also lower the vacancy rate, possibly to between 60-80 positions on a regular basis. ITD cannot exceed the authorized total of 1,648 employees, nor can it exceed the allotted personnel budget.

In response to Vice Chairman Kempton's question on the main reasons employees leave voluntarily, CHRO Williams responded that pay is the biggest factor for the departure of transportation technicians. Retirements are also a main reason. The Department is just starting to gather more in-depth information on separations. Staff will be analyzing the data and determining if steps can be taken to prevent some voluntary separations.

Chairman Moad thanked staff for the informative presentation.

<u>Child Passenger Safety</u>. Highway Safety Manager John Tomlinson reported that there have been 212 highway fatalities to date this year. Last year there were 217 at this time.

Boise Police Corporal Kyle Wills summarized the child passenger safety program. In the past two years, 119 new child passenger safety technicians were certified and 81 inspection sites were established throughout the state. A concerted effort is underway to train law enforcement officers on the basics of child protection safety. Nurses are eligible to get credits for attending child passenger safety technician training. Permanent child safety check sites are being established at fire stations, and the Meridian Fire Department is requiring child passenger safety technician certification for all of its new recruits. Corporal Wills also mentioned the valuable partnership with the Office of Highway Safety, and concluded with a summary on the recommendations for children to use various safety restraints.

Chairman Moad thanked Corporal Wills for the overview and for his service.

Annual Update on State Planning and Research (SPR) Program. Ned Parrish, Research Program Manager (RPM), said federal statutes require 2% of federal funding for roads and bridges be used for planning and research and a 20% match. A minimum of 25% of those funds must be devoted to research-related activities. Some of the planning activities funded with FY20 SPR funds include developing the Idaho Transportation Investment Program, statewide transportation plans, the Statewide Freight Plan, and the Transportation Asset Management Plan;

overseeing decision-making for 129,000 pound truck route requests; collecting pavement condition data; and producing annual average daily traffic maps.

RPM Parrish said the FY20 Research Program budget is \$1,770,072. Some of the projects completed in FY19 include developed and evaluated performance measures to augment asphalt mix design, evaluated skid resistance of pavements at different speeds, and analyzed statewide freight data and commodity supply chains. Some of the projects planned in FY20 are integration of weed-suppressive bacterial with herbicide and seeding, real-time bridge scour monitoring to improve scour equations, and development of a web-based environmental document preparation and data management system to support project delivery.

Chairman Moad thanked RPM Parrish for the overview on the Research Program.

FY20 Rescission of Federal Contract Authority. Joel Drake, Financial Manager – Financial Planning and Analysis (FM-FP&A) said the federal rescission of contract authority was going to remove \$7.6 billion nationally from the balance of unobligated contract authority for Federal Highway Administration programs funded by the Federal Highway Trust Fund in July 2020. The reduction to each state would have been based on the state's proportion of unobligated contract authority that existed nationwide on September 30, 2019. However, this morning the U.S. Senate approved a continuing resolution through December 20, 2019 that included revocation of the rescission, so the issue is now moot.

Chairman Moad thanked FM-FP&A Drake for the update.

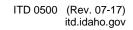

The purpose for these US-95 Bridge Projects is to improve the safety, mobility, and economic opportunity of US-95 by replacing two aging bridges (WIR Bridge and Deep Creek Bridge), providing traffic safety improvements by adding turn lanes on US-95 at SH-6 and Kennedy Ford Road, and "flattening" the horizontal curve of US-95 north of the WIR bridge. The projects are companioned for professional design services given the close proximity to help match bridge profiles and the adjacent roadway sections.

In July 2017, a design services agreement with HDR Engineering, Inc. was approved in the amount of \$999,825. Since that time, several developments have justified an additional supplemental.

- Retaining wall structure added adjacent to Deep Creek Bridge (Key No. 19195). This has been added to
 mitigate ROW take needed adjacent to the Deep Creek Bridge and the negative impact to the affected parcels.
 This requires additional foundation investigation and wall design and plans.
- 2. Additional survey for ROW and boundary for all three projects. The original scope assumed 4 parcels would require ROW acquisition for these projects. The selected alternative for the projects requires an additional 5 parcels that will require ROW acquisition. The original scope of work also included setting or finding monuments at all applicable existing and proposed ROW line changes in direction. The original scope assumed a total of 15 monuments would be set but as the projects progressed, it has been determined that there is a total of 57 ROW monuments that will be required to be set.
- 3. For all three projects, locations of the proposed detour routes, accesses and storm water treatment locations were determined after the initial field work and wetland report was originally completed and some of these extend outside of the originally evaluated areas. Therefore, additional wetland delineation and an addendum to the Wetlands and Cultural Resources Reports are required.
- 4. There was an unforeseen delay due to the approval of the MOA between FHWA and ITD and the interested historical entities for the resolution of adverse effects to the Deep Creek Bridge and the WIR Bridge (Key Nos. 19195 and 129653).
- 5. Additional project management effort as well as an intermediate design review was added to the projects to allow for certain design tasks to continue and keep the project as expedited as possible until we receive environmental approval and are able to begin final design work.

These factors have all contributed to the total design fee being increased from the original \$999,825 to approximately \$1,150,000.

HDR is also likely to be retained for engineer of record services during construction, and those services are estimated to be \$50,000. This request includes those services as well in order to expedite the execution of a future agreement.

This request is for approval to exceed the professional services agreement amount on this project to an estimated \$1,200,000 to cover the completion of the design services and the engineer of record services during construction.

Funding for this additional work will be worked out with HQ PMO office with the funding anticipated to come from either extra PC monies from KN 20704, US12 Orofino to Greer or from extra CN monies from 19640, SH3 Top of Bear Ridge Grade to Pine Creek.

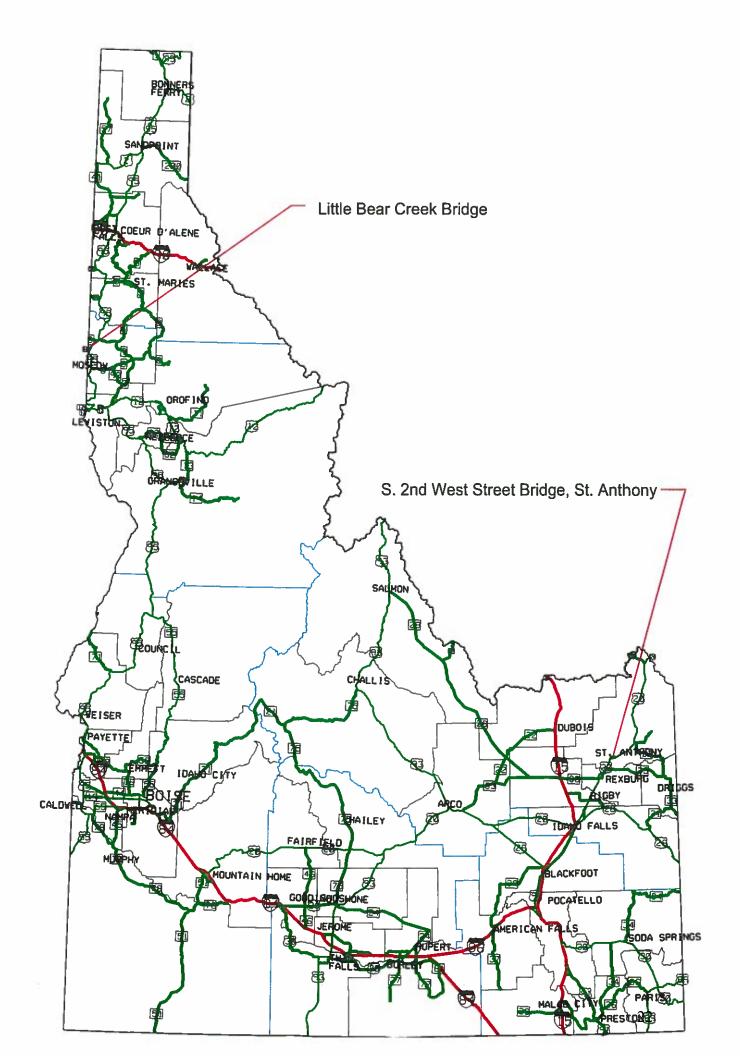

RE: Justification of Bid for Award

Bids were opened on October 22, 2019, for the S 2nd West Street Bridge project in the City of St. Anthony. LHTAC and the design consultant have reviewed the bid results. The Engineer's Estimate was \$841,119.05. Cannon Builders submitted the low bid at \$1,109,390.73 which was \$268,271.68 (31.9%) over the Engineer's Estimate.

The design for this project was completed in March of 2018. However, the project was held until funding became available with 2019 Year-End funds. LHTAC should have reviewed and updated the Engineer's Estimate when funding became available and the project was advertised, but did not. The Engineer's Estimate did not adequately reflect the increase in project costs experienced from the time the consultant submitted the project in 2018 until it was bid in October of 2019. LHTAC is reviewing their submittal process to ensure that Engineer's Estimates are updated to appropriately reflect current bidding trends on future delayed project submittals.

The major differences in the bid can be attributed to four items. These items accounted for \$298,971 or 111.4% of the overage.

Notes:

- 1. There has been a recent escalation in concrete prices due to the current economic conditions. When the estimate was prepared in 2018, the unit cost was in-line with the costs during that time. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.
- 2. Increased concrete and steel prices due to current economic conditions can be factors in the higher cost of this bid item. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.
- 3. The estimated cost for predrilling in rock is based on a depth of 6 feet per pile and our experience with past predrilling costs. This bid item may be inflated due to the prime contractor having to use a subcontractor and the current availability of specialty equipment.
- 4. A 10% value is usually applied to the estimated cost for other items to estimate mobilization for bridge projects per Article 16.2 of the ITD LRFD Bridge Manual, which is reflected in the estimate. The contractor may have amplified the cost of mobilization to account for unknown risks associated with the downstream power plant operations and construction in cold weather.

Article 16.1 of the ITD LRFD Bridge Manual now recommends that total bridge cost be estimated at \$260/SF + 30% increase for unknown contingency items, likely a response to the current economic conditions. Adjusting the Engineer's Estimate using this recommendation would indicate the low bid to be within 110% of the Engineer's Estimate.

Recommend for Award

It is the opinion of LHTAC, the City of St. Anthony, and the Design Engineer that the bids are reasonable considering the current bidding climate. It is not expected that there will be any benefit or project savings by re-advertising and rebidding this project at a later date. It is the desire of the Sponsor and LHTAC to award the construction project to the apparent low bidder. The City of St. Anthony has agreed to provide an additional \$175,000 to help cover the funding shortfall in addition to the estimated additional match of \$12,812.57. Additional funding to cover the contract award are made available through the Contract Increase Set-Aside.

- The relatively small quantity of this item (552 tons) and the remote location of the project indicate that
 this price is reasonable. The next lowest bidder presented a bid that was \$5,520 higher than the low
 bid. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.
- 2. There has been a recent escalation in concrete prices due to the current economic conditions. When the estimate was prepared in 2018, the unit cost was in-line with the costs during that time. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.
- 3. Increased steel prices due to current economic conditions can be factors in the higher cost of this bid item. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.
- 4. The methods and means for temporary diversion of flows can vary widely between contractors based on anticipated water flows and other site conditions and is very difficult to estimate. The consultant's review of this item indicates that the bid price is reasonable for project conditions and uncertainties. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.
- 5. A 10% value is usually applied to the estimated cost for mobilization. The low bidder, RAZZ Construction, is located in Bellingham Washington, thus requiring increased mobilization costs. The second low bidder, located in Coeur d'Alene, estimated mobilization \$14,000 higher than the low bid. The relatively remote location of the project limits the number of local construction companies available to bid. If the project were re-bid, this cost will likely not decrease.

In our review of the apparent low bid, there are no discrepancies showing this bid is irregular. The project received only two valid bids, both of which indicate that the price of both concrete and steel are still on the rise given the bid over the Engineer's Estimate.

Recommend for Award

It is the opinion of LHTAC, the City of Troy, and the Design Engineer that the bids are reasonable considering the current bidding climate and location of the project. It is not expected that there will be any benefit or project savings by re-advertising and rebidding this project at a later date. It is the desire of the Sponsor and LHTAC to award the construction project to the apparent low bidder. Additional funding to cover the contract award are made available through the Contract Increase Set-Aside. The City of Troy is prepared to provide the additional estimated match of \$31,245.48.

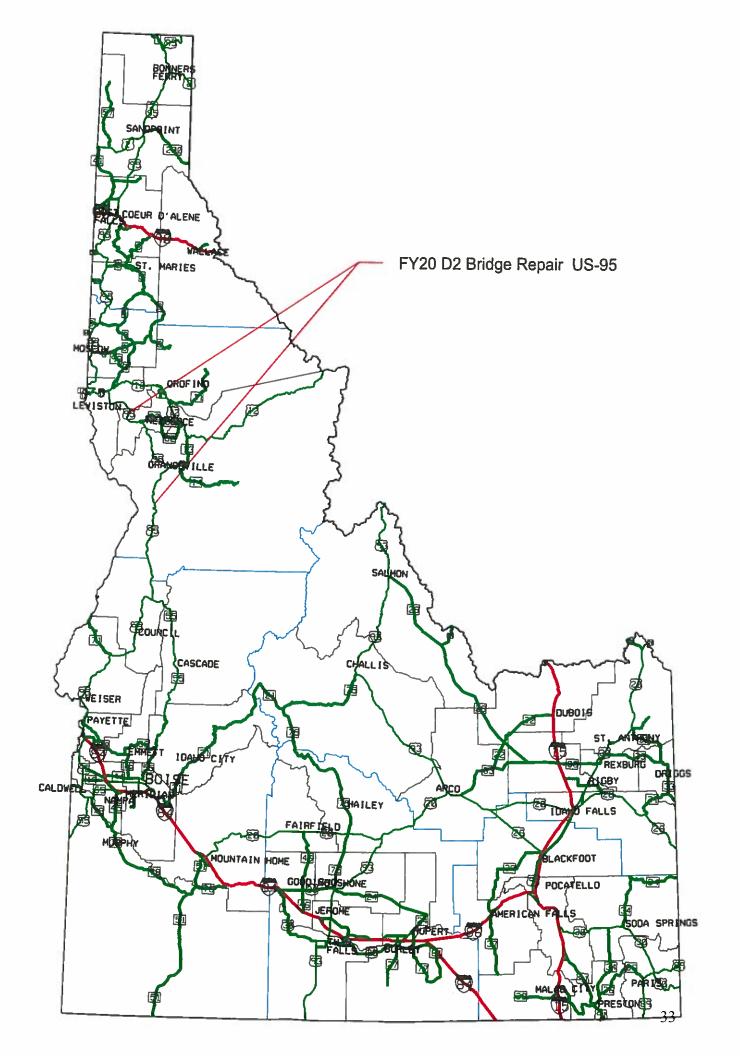

The bids were opened on October 8, 2019, there were 2 bidders. The low bid was \$1,619,861.52, which is \$266,231.22 above the Engineer's Estimate (EE) or 119.67% of EE. The difference between the low bid and the EE was primarily in the following 3 items.

Item S501-51A SP Bridge Epoxy Overlay was 110% of EE, an additional \$49,113.20 Item S904-05C SP Temporary Traffic Control 200% of EE, an Additional \$125,000.00 Item Z629-05A Mobilization 284% of EE, an additional \$226,944.00

These 3 additional amounts account for \$401,057.20 or 24.8% of the bid amount.

The Engineer's Estimate was based on the average unit prices for similar projects and reviewed by the Estimating Team. However, the District believes the increase in prices are in large part due to unknown removal items in one of the structures, increased mobilization due to having 13 bridges in various location within the district and unknown traffic control costs. The mobilization was based on the standard 10% of the entire cost and should have been increased to account for the various locations.

Therefore, the District would like to reject the bids and rebid later in the winter for a 2020 construction period (June-Sept).

If the rebid is approved, the District is planning to update the information regarding the unknown removal items, increase the mobilization amount and also revise the traffic control items to include a more comprehensive Traffic Control Plan. Also, we believe readvertising this winter, when contractors are less busy with construction, would increase the number of bidders, which is recommended. Any needed funds will be obtained from other project savings and statewide balancing.

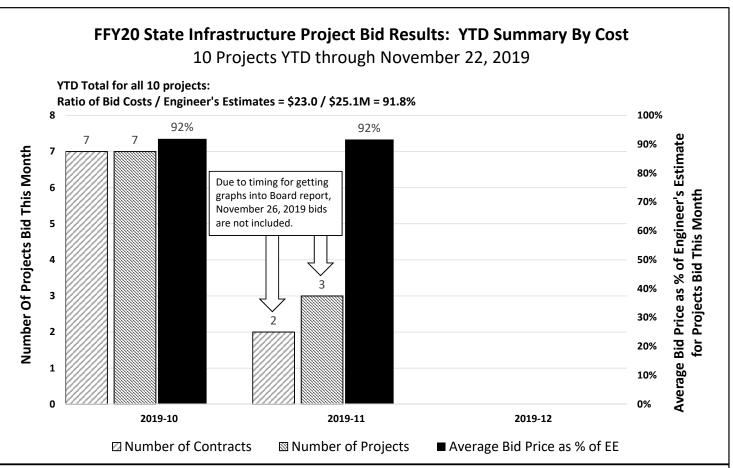

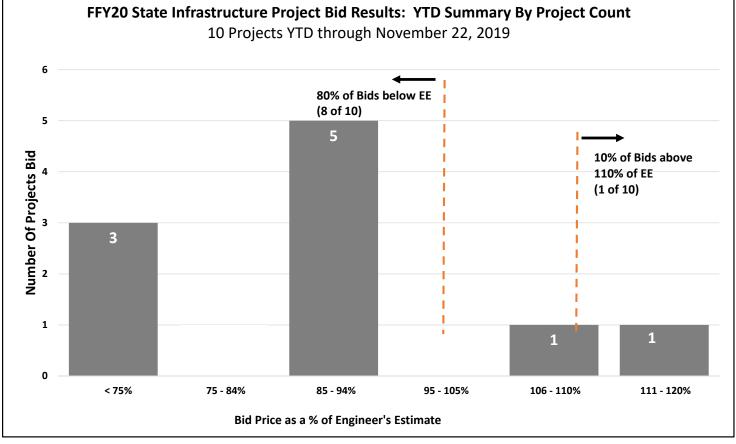

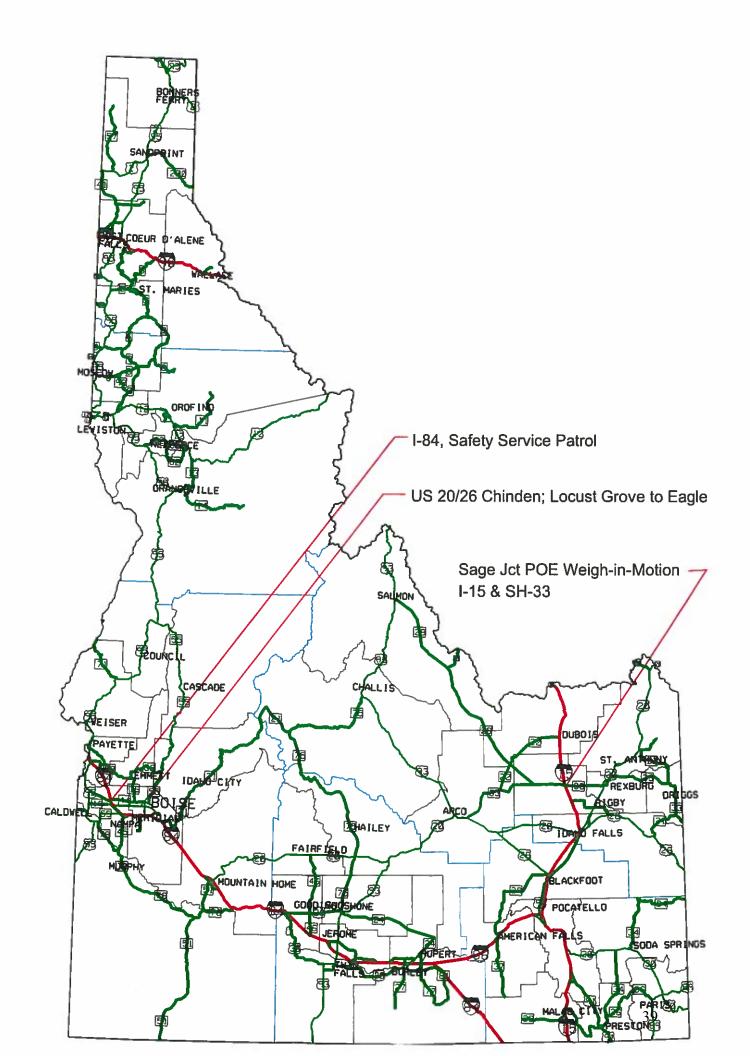

At the July 2019 Idaho Transportation Board meeting, staff presented the Board a final draft of a 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan for approval. The Board passed a resolution that approved the 2040 Long-Range Transportation Plan as the document was presented (understanding it would still be submitted to the Federal Highway Administration for review). The final has been reviewed by the FHWA with no objections to conformity with the FAST (Fixing America's Surface Transportation) Act. Staff will now publish the document as final, produce a limited number of hard copies, post an electronic copy on the department's website and produce a public friendly shortened version in early 2020.

Background Information

July 01, 2019 thru October 31, 2019, Fiscal Year 2020 Financial Statements

The financial operations of the Department as of October 31, 2019 shows this fiscal year with revenue coming in ahead of forecast year-to-date and the expenditures are following projected budgets.

- Revenues to the State Highway Account from all state sources are ahead of forecast by 6.4%. Of that total, receipts from the Highway Distribution Account are ahead of forecast by 6% or \$4.4M. State revenues to the State Aeronautics Fund are ahead of forecast by 4.5% or \$56,000. Staff will continue to monitor revenue and provide future updates.
- Expenditures are within planned budgets YTD. The differences are timing differences between planned and actual expenditures plus encumbrances estimated through the first four months of the year. Personnel costs have savings of \$4.1M or 9.7% is due to reserves for horizontal career path increases, vacancies and timing between a position becoming vacant and filled.
- Contract construction cash expenditures through October of this year has exceeded any from the past three
 years: FY20 = \$223.8 M; FY19 = \$218.5 M; FY18 = \$210.9 M. After four months in this fiscal year this is a
 very positive result and will assist in helping ITD achieve its objective to reduce the outstanding obligated
 but un-spent balances in this category.

The balance of the long term investments as of the end of October is \$138.7 Million. These funds are obligated against both construction projects and encumbrances. The long term investments plus the cash balance (\$34.6M) totals \$173.3M, which is \$41M less than the end of June.

Expenditures in the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund (GF Surplus), through the month of October, were \$11.3M. There are no additional funds (other than interest earned on the cash balance) coming into this fund with the expiration of the law effective May 31, 2019 that required the transfer.

Deposits into the Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund of \$6.6M is 9.3% ahead of forecast. The receipts into this fund for FY20 are committed to construction projects identified in the ITIP.

PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COUNCIL (PTAC)

Created by Section 40-514, Idaho Code, to advise the Idaho Transportation Department on issues and policies regarding public transportation in Idaho. The Council shall be composed of six members appointed by the Idaho Transportation Board. Two members shall be appointed from each of the three Transportation Department Districts as provided in Section 40-303, Idaho Code and appointment will be such that the Department's six planning districts will be represented. The term of each member shall be three years and the initial appointments to the Council shall be such that two members shall be appointed each year thereafter. The number of Council meetings per year shall not exceed the number of meetings authorized by the Transportation Board. Members of the Advisory Council shall be reimbursed according to the provisions of Section 59-509(g), Idaho Code, which states the sum of \$35.00 per day, plus reasonable and necessary travel expenses, subject to the limits provided in Section 67-2008, Idaho Code.

STATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM ADJUSTMENTS

Purpose

This policy sets forth the procedure to make adjustments to the State Highway System that serves statewide economic interests, movement of products and materials, and statewide mobility.

Legal Authority

- Idaho Code 40-120(5) Definition of State Highway System.
- Idaho Code 40-203(B) The Department may abandon or assume control of a highway with the consent of the local highway jurisdiction.
- Idaho Code 40-310(1) The Board shall determine which highways in the state, or sections of highways shall be designated and accepted as part of the State Highway System.
- Idaho Code 40-310(3) The Board has authority to abandon any highway and remove it from the State Highway System.

The Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments is authorized to review and make recommendation of a State Highway System addition, removal or other State Highway System adjustment. The Board recognizes that local travel needs are most effectively met by the local highway jurisdiction using county highway systems and local roads.

Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments

All requests for adjustment (addition, removal, or other system action) to the State Highway System are referred to the Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments for consideration before Department staff undertakes any actions or studies. The Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments is comprised of:

- A Chairman of the Subcommittee appointed by the Transportation Board Chairman;
- A general member of the Subcommittee, also appointed by the Transportation Board Chairman;
 and
- A rotating member appointed by the Board Subcommittee Chairman on a meeting-by-meeting basis. If a system adjustment is on the agenda, the Board member representing the district in which the adjustment occurs shall be the rotating member.

In the event the agenda includes a proposed adjustment to the Highway System in a currently appointed board member's district, an additional member shall be appointed to the subcommittee for that item. All Transportation Board members as described above are voting members.

<u>The Transportation Board Chairman shall appoint a Chairman of the Subcommittee, a "general" Subcommittee member and a "floating" Subcommittee member. A Transportation Board member and a "floating" Subcommittee member.</u>

representing a State Highway District which has an adjustment request/issue on the Subcommittee agenda shall have the opportunity to attend the meeting and vote as a full member of the Subcommittee in place of the "floating" member. The "floating" member shall attend meetings where the Chairman of the Subcommittee, or the "general" member of the Subcommittee, is representing his/her individual State Highway District. A quorum to conduct business shall be two members attending.

Staff as needed, may provide assistance to the subcommittee:

- Chief Engineer or his designee;
- District Engineer or designee from the affected district when the subcommittee's agenda includes an item proposing an adjustment to the State Highway System in that area;
- Administrator of the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council or designee;
- Representative from the Federal Highway Administration;
- Representative from the Attorney General's Office;
- Executive Assistant/Secretary to the Board; and a
- Representative from the Division of Highway Development Engineering Services.

The appropriate District Engineer or a delegate works with the Board Subcommittee on the proposed system adjustments in his respective district. The Executive Assistant to the Board schedules meetings as necessary.

State Highway Evaluation

Upon review of the request for a State Highway System adjustment, the Board Subcommittee directs the Director, or delegate, to conduct an analysis and establish System Procedures to determine the highway's operating and network characteristics using criteria that has been reviewed and approved by the Idaho Transportation Board.

State Highway System Action

When a State Highway System action is warranted, the Director, or a delegate, negotiates with the local highway jurisdiction on the proposed adjustment. In the event the Department establishes a new state highway, such as, but not limited to, an alternate route, bypass, and/or interchange, the Director, or delegate, works closely to negotiate state highway adjustments with the local highway jurisdiction prior to the project being entered into the Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP).

The Director, or delegate, is encouraged to be creative and consider all feasible options in the negotiations, including financial assistance or maintenance assistance such as snowplowing or striping.

The full Idaho Transportation Board has final approval of all transactions on the State Highway System; adjustments are accomplished by an "Official Minute". The Department and the local highway jurisdiction signs a cooperative agreement whenever needed to clarify responsibilities and other specifications.

STATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM ADJUSTMENTS

Purpose

This policy sets forth the procedure to make adjustments to the State Highway System that serves statewide economic interests, movement of products and materials, and statewide mobility.

Legal Authority

- Idaho Code 40-120(5) Definition of State Highway System.
- Idaho Code 40-203(B) The Department may abandon or assume control of a highway with the consent of the local highway jurisdiction.
- Idaho Code 40-310(1) The Board shall determine which highways in the state, or sections of highways shall be designated and accepted as part of the State Highway System.
- Idaho Code 40-310(3) The Board has authority to abandon any highway and remove it from the State Highway System.

The Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments is authorized to review and make recommendation of a State Highway System addition, removal or other State Highway System adjustment. The Board recognizes that local travel needs are most effectively met by the local highway jurisdiction using county highway systems and local roads.

Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments

All requests for adjustment (addition, removal, or other system action) to the State Highway System are referred to the Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments for consideration before Department staff undertakes any actions or studies.

The Transportation Board Chairman shall appoint a Chairman of the Subcommittee, a "general" Subcommittee member and a "floating" Subcommittee member. A Transportation Board member representing a State Highway District which has an adjustment request/issue on the Subcommittee agenda shall have the opportunity to attend the meeting and vote as a full member of the Subcommittee in place of the "floating" member. The "floating" member shall attend meetings where the Chairman of the Subcommittee, or the "general" member of the Subcommittee, is representing his/her individual State Highway District. A quorum to conduct business shall be two members attending.

Staff as needed, may provide assistance to the subcommittee:

- Chief Engineer or his designee;
- District Engineer or designee from the affected district when the subcommittee's agenda includes an item proposing an adjustment to the State Highway System in that area;
- Administrator of the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council or designee;

- Representative from the Federal Highway Administration;
- Representative from the Attorney General's Office;
- Executive Assistant/Secretary to the Board; and a
- Representative from the Division of Highway Development

The appropriate District Engineer or a delegate works with the Board Subcommittee on the proposed system adjustments in his respective district. The Executive Assistant to the Board schedules meetings as necessary.

State Highway Evaluation

Upon review of the request for a State Highway System adjustment, the Board Subcommittee directs the Director, or delegate, to conduct an analysis and establish System Procedures to determine the highway's operating and network characteristics using criteria that has been reviewed and approved by the Idaho Transportation Board.

State Highway System Action

When a State Highway System action is warranted, the Director, or a delegate, negotiates with the local highway jurisdiction on the proposed adjustment. In the event the Department establishes a new state highway, such as, but not limited to, an alternate route, bypass, and/or interchange, the Director, or delegate, works closely to negotiate state highway adjustments with the local highway jurisdiction prior to the project being entered into the Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP).

The Director, or delegate, is encouraged to be creative and consider all feasible options in the negotiations, including financial assistance or maintenance assistance such as snowplowing or striping.

The full Idaho Transportation Board has final approval of all transactions on the State Highway System; adjustments are accomplished by an "Official Minute". The Department and the local highway jurisdiction signs a cooperative agreement whenever needed to clarify responsibilities and other specifications.

STATE HIGHWAY SYSTEM ADJUSTMENTS

Purpose

The purpose of this policy is to implement Board Policy 4061 authorizing the Director to set forth the procedure to make adjustments to the State Highway System that serves statewide economic interests, movement of products and materials, and statewide mobility.

Legal Authority

- Idaho Code 40-120(5) Definition of State Highway System.
- Idaho Code 40-203(B) The Department may abandon or assume control of a highway with the consent of the local highway jurisdiction.
- Idaho Code 40-310(1) The Board shall determine which highways in the state, or sections of highways, shall be designated and accepted as a part of the State Highway System.
- Idaho Code 40-310(3) The Board has authority to abandon any highway and remove it from the State Highway System.

Adjustment to the State Highway System

Whenever a local highway jurisdiction proposes a change to the State Highway System (addition/removal/relocation/etc.), the appropriate District Engineer or a delegate refers the request to the Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments. Upon Board Subcommittee concurrence, the appropriate District Engineer or delegate conducts an analysis of the highway's operating and network characteristics using criteria adopted by the Idaho Transportation Board. The Idaho Transportation Department State Highway System Adjustments Procedures (hereafter known as SA Procedures) document contains the approved criteria.

System Action Evaluation

The appropriate District Engineer or delegate prepares a report that evaluates the requested adjustments based on the criteria contained within the SA Procedures document and submits to the Chief Engineer.

The Chief Engineer or delegate reviews the adjustment analysis and presents the findings to the Board Subcommittee. The Board Subcommittee on State Highway System Adjustments analyzes the evaluation report, the Additions and Deletions Change Request form and the merits of the routes proposed for system adjustment to determine routes that are appropriate for further consideration. The Division of Engineering Services maintains a record of all requests, studies and results for any adjustment proposals for the State Highway System and complies with the procedures provided within the SA Procedures document.

State Highway System Adjustment Process

Upon Board Subcommittee recommendation of a State Highway System addition, removal, or other adjustment, take the following actions:

- The District Engineer or delegate contacts the appropriate local jurisdiction(s) to further
 investigate the proposed system action. If the local jurisdiction is interested, conducts
 negotiations to reach an agreement on the action. The District Engineer considers all feasible
 options, including monetary appropriations and maintenance assistance such as
 snowplowing, striping, and discussing the date of the system action to assure minimal
 revenue and budget impact.
- 2. The appropriate District Engineer conveys the results of the negotiation meeting to the Board Subcommittee, the Director, and the Chief Engineer.
- 3. A public hearing is required for proposed actions that abandon, relocate or replace an existing route on the State Highway System serving or traversing a city, or the area in which a city is located. The ITD Public Involvement Coordinator coordinates a public hearing with the involved parties, provides news releases and other assistance. A public hearing is conducted as is appropriate for the system action.
- 4. The appropriate District Engineer prepares the draft agreements and sends to the Division of Engineering Services and Legal for review. At the direction of the Board, the District Engineer presents a Highway System Agreement to the affected local highway jurisdiction for signature. The agreement addresses all issues from the public hearing testimony (if a hearing was required), include reference to the maintenance reimbursement option selected by the local highway jurisdiction (if applicable), and outline the process for conveyance of the right-of-way. All negotiations, terms and conditions will be concluded promptly and not exceed a 2-year timeframe, unless otherwise approved by the Board.
- 5. Once an acceptable agreement has been made, the Official Minute is presented to the Idaho Transportation Board for a system action determination.
- 6. If financial payment is agreed to, the Chief Engineer shall ensure that the paperwork is completed and payment made to the local highway jurisdiction.

Official Minute

The appropriate District Engineer or delegate prepares the Official Minute in concurrence with the Board Subcommittee for all system action determinations that are presented to the Idaho Transportation Board. The Official Minute provides the reason for action, describes the changes to the State Highway System, and establishes an effective date. The Official Minute is also the basis for title transfer of the real property to the proper owners. The Executive Assistant to the Board files the original Official Minute in the exhibit book and approval/disapproval is noted in the minutes of the Idaho Transportation Board meeting. The Division of Engineering Services sends copies of the approved Official Minute to the affected district, local highway jurisdiction, city officials (when involved), the Port of Entry section in headquarters, and others as appropriate.

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Board has reviewed the update to Board Policy 4061 State Highway System Adjustments.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Idaho Transportation Board adopts Board Policy 4061 State Highway System Adjustments in substantial form.

IDAHO TRANSPORTATION BOARD SUBCOMMITTEES

April 2019

Subcommittee on Adjustments to the State Highway System

The Board Subcommittee on Adjustments to the State Highway System was established in 1996 to review requests to add mileage to the state highway system and to relinquish miles from the state's system. The Subcommittee submits recommendations to the full Board for consideration.

<u>Current Board Members:</u> Jim Kempton (chair) and Bob Hoff. Additionally, a rotating Board member serves on the Subcommittee, determined on a meeting-by-meeting basis. For example, the Board member in whose District a route is being considered will be the third member unless the route is in a current Subcommittee member's District, then the chair will ask a random member to serve on the Subcommittee for that meeting.

Meetings are held on an as-needed basis, but probably average one or two per year.

NOTE: Assuming the Board approves revisions to Board Policy 4061 State Highway System Adjustments at the December 2019 meeting, a third, "floating" or rotating member needs to be appointed.

Subcommittee on Audits

The Board established an Audit Subcommittee in 2003. The charge is to interact with internal and external auditors and perform specific financial and internal control related assignments as the Subcommittee and Board deem appropriate, with periodic reports to the Board.

<u>Current Board Members</u>: Julie DeLorenzo (chair) and Jan Vassar.

The Subcommittee generally meets once or twice per year; however, there have been discussions on expanding to quarterly meetings.

Subcommittee on Policies

Created in 2012 to review every Board Policy and introduce the policies to the Board for action. Its charge was expanded to include review of Administrative Policies.

Current Board Members: Jan Vassar (chair) and Julie DeLorenzo

Initially, the Subcommittee met monthly, but now meets on an as-needed basis. There are still 2 outstanding Board Policies to review and about 12 Administrative Policies.

Subcommittee on 129,000 Pound Truck Routes

The Board Subcommittee on 129,000 Pound Truck Routes was established in 2013 to implement Senate Bill 1117, allowing for permitted vehicles to haul up to 129,000 pounds on additional routes, and to oversee the process to consider additional routes. Recommendations are made to the full Board.

<u>Current Board Members:</u> Dwight Horsch (chair), and Jim Thompson. Additionally, a rotating Board member serves on the Subcommittee, determined on a meeting-by-meeting basis. For example, the Board member in whose District a route is being considered will be the third member unless the route is in a current Subcommittee member's District, then the chair will ask a random member to serve on the Subcommittee for that meeting.

The Subcommittee meets on an as-needed basis.

NOTE: Per Board Policy 4063 129,000 Pound Vehicle Truck Routes, a third, "floating" or rotating member needs to be appointed.

LOCAL HIGHWAY TECHNICAL ASSISTANCE COUNCIL (LHTAC)

A public agency, created in Section 40-2401, Idaho Code. LHTAC represents its members in meetings and hearings related to highways, roads and streets, and other transportation factors effecting local highway jurisdictions. The Council consists of nine members, 3 each appointed by the association of cities, counties, and highway districts. The members serve at the pleasure of the appointing agency. The Council, its officers, and employees are not subject to the administrative or management control of the Idaho Transportation Department. Council members are compensated to a maximum of \$100/day as determined by the members' respective associations, and reimbursed for actual and necessary expenses according to the provisions of Section 40-2401(3) Idaho Code. Compensation and reimbursement are paid from the LHTAC accounts established in Section 40-717 Idaho Code.
