Contest Rules:

- Employees may enter up to five entries each week showcasing either a work activity or job site. Entries can also be beauty shots.
- Entries must be taken within the contest timeframe.
- There are no limits as to what kind of camera you may use.
- The file should be named as follows: ContestantName_LocationDetails_ActivityName_Date
 - \circ Location details could include milepost, route, town, etc.
 - \circ Photos will remain anonymous during judging.
- Send photos via email to public information specialists; HQ counts as its own district; if you are assigned to
 more than one district, submit to the district where you work the most. For your PIS see Picking the Winner
- Email subject should be labeled as: Photo Contest Contestant Name

The Prize: Canvas, acrylic or metal print of winning image to display in office or shed

PHOTO TIPS

- Ensure safety is your priority before taking a photo. Also ensure that your photo shows safe practices. After all, we can't use anything that doesn't look safe!
- What is the main subject of your photo?
- When taking pictures with a phone, use a horizontal orientation:



• Don't rely on the zoom function, try to get closer for better quality.

- What is in the background? What is not in the background?
- Think about what is in focus and what is not in focus.



- Take a lot of pictures! The more you have the more chances one of them is *really* good.
- Choose largest/actual file size when uploading your images.
