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IDAHO TRANSPORTATION BOARD SUBCOMMITTEES February 2024

Subcommittee on 129,000 Pound Truck Routes

Established in 2013 to implement Senate Bill 1117, allowing for permitted vehicles to haul up to 129,000 pounds on additional routes, and to oversee the process to consider additional routes. Recommendations are made to the full Board.

Board Membership: Jim Thompson (chair) and Bob Hoff and Mitch Watkins, who will be the "floating" member.

The Subcommittee meets on an as-needed basis about one or two times per year.

Subcommittee on Adjustments to the State Highway System

Established in 1996 to review requests to add mileage to the state highway system and to relinquish miles from the state's system. Recommendations are made to the full Board.

<u>Board Membership</u>: Julie DeLorenzo (chair) and John Bulger and Gary Osborn, who will be the "floating" member.

Subcommittee meets on an as-needed basis about one or two times per year.

Subcommittee on Audits

Established in 2003. The charge is to interact with internal and external auditors and perform specific financial and internal control related assignments as the Subcommittee and Board deem appropriate, with periodic reports to the Board.

Board Membership: John Bulger (chair) and Mitch Watkins.

The Subcommittee generally meets one or two times per year.

Subcommittee on Policies

Created in 2012 to review all Board Policies. Its charge expanded to include review of Administrative Policies. Recommendations are made to the full Board.

Board Membership: Gary Osborn (chair), Julie DeLorenzo, and Bob Hoff.

The Subcommittee meets on an as-needed basis about two or three times per year.

The "floating" member shall serve on the Subcommittee unless a non-appointed member has a route under consideration, then that non-appointed member shall participate on the Subcommittee. The intent is to ensure the board member in whose district a route is being discussed serves for that meeting or portion of meeting when his/her district's route is under consideration.

January 24, 2024

The Idaho Transportation Board met at 8:30 AM on Wednesday, January 24, 2024, in Boise, Idaho. The following principals were present:

Sign Shop Tour. The Board toured the traffic sign shop located at the District 3 office.

<u>Safety Share</u>. Flight Operations Director Tim Steffens reported on the multiple use of Unmanned Aircraft System (Drone) technology to mitigate employee safety risks. It also provides the opportunity to collect and share data.

<u>Board Minutes</u>. Member Osborn made a motion to approve the minutes of December 13, 2023, seconded by Member Hoff, and the motion passed unanimously.

Board Meeting Dates. The next meeting is February 21, 2024 in Boise.

<u>Consent Items</u>. Member Hoff made a motion, seconded by Vice Chair DeLorenzo, and passed unopposed, to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, consent calendar items are to be routine, non-controversial, self-ITB24-01 explanatory items that can be approved in one motion; and

WHEREAS, Idaho Transportation Board members have the prerogative to remove items from the consent calendar for questions or discussion.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board approves the contracts for award.

1) Contract to award. The low bids on the following projects are more than ten percent over the engineer's estimate, requiring justification. KN#20726, bridge repair, I-15, District 6:

contractor: Cannon Builders for \$872,498.00. KN#23810 SIA, striping, I-86 & I-15, District 6: contractor: Clear Zone Construction for \$888,140.28.

Informational Items.

1) Contract awards and advertisements. There were six ITD and no Local contracts awarded that did not require Board approval for the month of December 2023. Year to date, from December 1, 2023 to December 31, 2023, 22 ITD and 10 Local contracts were bid, of which six ITD and four Local contracts requiring Board approval were awarded.

The list of projects currently under advertisement was provided.

- 2) Professional services agreements and term agreement work tasks report. From November 20, 2023 to December 24, 2023, 19 new professional services agreements and work tasks were processed, totaling \$9,065,407. No supplemental agreements to existing professional services agreements were processed during this period.
- 3) Administrative settlements in right of way acquisition report. During the semi-annual period of July 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023, the Right of Way Section processed 88 parcels. Of the 88 parcels, 40 parcels had an Administrative Settlement. Parcels where right of way acquisitions are ongoing have been excluded and will be provided on future reports.
- 4) Monthly report of federal formula program funding through January 2. Idaho received \$184.2 million in obligation authority (OA) through January 19, 2024 via a continuing resolution. It includes \$35.2 million of Highway Infrastructure General Funds and \$45 million in Bridge Formula funds. FY24 OA through January 19th is 38.7% of apportionments. Allotted program funding through January 19th is \$198.8 million with \$233.8 million remaining as of January 2nd.
- 5) Non-construction professional services contracts. Board Policy 4001 states, 'Each month the Chief Administrative Officer shall report to the Board all non-construction professional service agreements entered into by the Department.' One agreement was executed during the previous month to Catch Intelligence for data analytic strategic planning for \$90,000.
- 6) Annual report on status of state-owned dwellings. The department owns three stick framed houses, 25 manufactured homes, six bunkhouses, and one manufactured home at Johnson Creek and one at Cavanaugh Bay Air Strips that are used seasonally. In addition to the houses, 11 locations have employee owned manufactured housing on ITD provided trailer pads. ITD also owns seven trailer pads and four houses at rest area locations around the state. Currently, they are actively engaged in the construction of seven new homes.
- 7) <u>FY24 financial statements</u>. Revenues to the State Highway Account from all state sources as of November 30 are ahead of forecast by 4.7% and revenues in the Highway Distribution Account are up 4.7%. State revenues to the State Aeronautics Fund are slightly below forecast by 5.0%. The Department's expenditures were within planned budgets.

Personnel costs savings of \$2.5 million is due to vacancies and timing. Contract construction cash expenditures in the SHA are \$319.7M for the first five months, and total construction expenditures from the five different funds sources total \$508.5M.

The balance of the long-term investments was \$180.4M as of the end of November. These funds are obligated against construction projects and encumbrances. The cash balance is \$112.5M. Expenditures in the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund is \$67.9M. Deposits into the Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund is \$50.3M. The Federal CARES Act provided \$27.3M for public transportation. FY24 expenditures are \$2.5M. Expenditures for the TECM bond program during this period is \$96.6M and \$11.3M for GARVEE.

<u>Member Kempton.</u> Chairman Moad announced this is Member Kempton's last board meeting as he is retiring after two six-year terms with the Board. Member Kempton thanked staff for their leadership and dedication.

Chairman Moad introduced Member Kempton's District 4 replacement, Mitch Watkins, whose term starts next month. Member Watkins' gubernatorial appointment is pending senate confirmation, but was present to meet board members and staff.

<u>Director's Monthly Report</u>. Director Stokes thanked Member Kempton for his service not just on the Board, but throughout his career with the Airforce and state legislature – noting how invaluable his analysis and insight has meant to ITD and the community.

Director Stokes reported on ITD's 50-year benchmark, the Governor's FY25 budget recommendations and line items, an upcoming workshop, a new employee recognition program, community engagement, DMV's online Skip the Trip, recognition received for employees, and shared a video featuring the staff who operate ITD's snow plows. Some highlights included this year marks the 50-year anniversary of the creation of ITD incorporating aeronautics and public transportation functions. It was effective July 1, 1974. Prior to that, it was the Highway Department since its inception in 1950. The Governor's FY25 budget recommendation includes funding for his Idaho Works Initiative and increases TECM funding by \$50 million. The FY25 budget includes funding for a new headquarters' maintenance operations facility at Chinden Campus, sight development and design for a new District 4 administrative office, and 53 additional positions for workforce planning.

Director Stokes stated ITD will hold a workshop next month as part of the board meeting to discuss investments in pavement and other projects. The new Recognizing ITD's Super Employees (RISE) program was implemented, which is an employee developed program established to recognize peers. Over the summer, the executive leadership met with employees and again with supervisors around the state to receive feedback. He gave special thanks to Chief Innovation Experience Officer Brenda Williams for her service on AASHTO's Human Resources Committee and Legal's Lisa Hoag who receive the Wyakin Foundation Volunteer of the Year Award. He concluded with and ITD produced video showcasing the staff behind the snowplow.

In respect to the recent increase in snowplow strikes, Member Kempton suggested staff consider legislative remedies. He stated fines may not be the solution, but noted the effort accomplished with increased penalties in work zone areas to enhance safety.

Legislative Update. Government Affairs Manager Colby Cameron stated the legislative session began January 8 with the Governor's State of the State address. The legislature has made record investments in transportation. Because the State's revenue forecast was not as strong as anticipated, budget proposals are being held to those projections. He reported on the Governor's recommendations for continued support in transportation investments using general fund revenue - noting user fees were not raised. The Joint Finance Appropriation Committee has already set ITD's program maintenance budget and will review remaining items at its February 8th budget hearing. Director Stokes presented ITD's agency report to both the House and Senate Transportation Committees earlier this week. ITD's rules were approved by the Senate Transportation Committee and ITD's three legislative proposals were introduced in the House Transportation Committee.

<u>FY25 Appropriation request – Governor's recommendation.</u> Controller Justin Collins introduced Dan Hansen who is the new Financial Services Manager.

FSM Hansen reviewed changes to ITD's FY25 appropriation request reflecting the Governor's recommendations for enhancements and adjustments to line items. Some highlights included \$2 million was added for Local bridge maintenance (Idaho Works Initiative) and \$50 million for Transportation Expansion & Congestion Mitigation investment. Change in Employee Compensation (CEC) was increased from 1% to 3% for a total of \$3.8 million. Replacement equipment was reduced by \$57,800, employer costs for employee insurance reduced by \$2.3 million, and the \$11 million for TAMS re-solicitation was removed. With the adjusted base of \$830.1 million, the total FY25 appropriation request it \$1.023 billion. Total program funding, including debt service and the Strategic Initiatives Program fund, is \$1.305 billion.

In response to Member Hoff's question about CEC and the 1% pay line shift, FSM Hansen stated employees would still be eligible to receive the additional 2% merit-based increase on top of the pay line adjustment.

Inflation and construction cost trends update. Chief Deputy Director Dan McElhinney stated this is staff's 6th update on inflation and construction cost. Provided in the board materials are project lists for bid award amounts totaling \$1.62 billion from October 2021 (FFY21) to January 2024 (FFY24), and projects planned for advertisement – January through April 2024.

Division Administrator Construction & Operations Dave Kuisti provided an update on inflation and construction costs. Some highlights included ITD has seen inflation of 20 – 30% since summer 2021, but seeing a flattening on unit prices and bids for 2023. Bids are leveling or declining on asphalt, rebar and cement overall. He reviewed cost indicators for diesel fuel,

asphalt, metal reinforcement and concrete. In FFY 2022, 69 state infrastructure projects were awarded with total bids equal to \$752.4 million, of which 2% were under the engineer's estimate (EE). In FFY 2023, 61 projects were awarded with bids totaling \$595.7 million, of which 11% were under EE. So far in FFY24, 16 projects have been awarded totaling \$280.2 million and 2.5% were above EE. ITD continues to average three bidders per project. DA Kuisti also reported on ongoing industry partnering efforts such as executive and pre-bid contractor outreach meetings, implementing a new partnering guide to help resolve issues and updating specifications, and continuing with allowances for fuel and asphalt price adjustments. In 2023, a construction partnering workshop was held to provide training to contractors, consultants and ITD staff. DA Kuisti provided updates on the US-95 Thorn Creek to Moscow, I-86/I-15 System Interchange, and SH-16, I-84 to US-20/26 (Phase II) projects.

In response to Member Osborn's question regarding locking in prices for fuel and liquid asphalt, DA Kuisti confirmed that ITD does index – 10% for fuel and 20% for asphalt.

<u>Transportation Expansion & Congestion Mitigation (TECM) program capacity and market update</u>. Division Administrator/Planning and TECM Program Amy Schroeder provided a review of the TECM program and bonding, revised project funding, funding sources, projects planned to be funded and projects in development. Some highlights included the TECM program began in 2021 where staff identified \$9 billion unfunded high priority needs, the Governor passed \$80 million guaranteed funding to be use as debt service, and the Board approved 13 TECM corridors statewide. The first two bond sales were in 2022 and 2023 respectively – with the third one in the next one two months and the final one later in 2024 or early in 2025..

DA Schroeder stated over the last two months, staff has finalized project costs and made adjustments to the proposed TECM 2024A series bonds revising total costs from \$400 million to \$372 million. Notable changes include the decision to not include funding for the three new development projects to see what action the legislature takes on Strategic Initiatives and TECM funding. Total projected funding for FY22 to FY30 dedicated to TECM projects is \$2.8 billion. Currently, there are 11 TECM bonded construction projects awarded from 2022 to 2024 totaling \$786.4 million. Six construction projects and \$10 million additional design and right of way on three projects were identified to utilize the TECM 2024A bond funds. There is approximately \$350 million in remaining bonding capacity. Projects selected will be based on project readiness and require Board approval. Grant funding is an option for some projects that may not be funded through the TECM program. Staff will revisit projects in development based on outcomes from the legislature on potential additional TECM funding.

In response to Member Hoff's question regarding the initial \$9 billion unfunded high priority needs, DA Schroeder responded those needs identified back in 2021 was a starting place and the TECM program is helping to satisfy some of those unmet needs.

In response to Member Osborn's question about the status and priority of US-95, Spalding Bridge and US-12, Arrow Bridge projects in development, DA Schroeder stated both those projects are good candidates for grant funding. Development will continue; however, selection

will be based on project readiness. More than likely, the Spalding Bridge will be ready before the Arrow Bridge.

Controller Justin Collins provided an update on the TECM 2024A bonding series progression. Some highlights included, because Citigroup is no longer in the municipal market, Bank of America and JP Morgan have been selected. Interest rates are lower than expected for the anticipated sale amount of \$372 million. ITD will receive the final ratings and post preliminary official statement by the first of next month, followed by the bond sale and then closing anticipated March 4th to 18th.

Request to increase agreement authorization for the US-12, Clearwater River Memorial Bridge project. State Design Engineer Monica Crider presented the request for professional services agreement authorization for the US-12 Clearwater River Memorial Bridge project by HDR Engineering. The project retrofits the existing structure to provide a widened bridge crossing that meets current standards. With the 2023 construction, engineering and inspection (CE&I) services agreement (\$993,285) the total 2024 agreement is \$2,531,000.

Member Osborn made a motion, seconded by Vice Chair DeLorenzo, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, Board Policy 4001 requires the Transportation Board to approve professional services agreements that exceed \$1 million; and

WHEREAS, District 2 will administer this project; and

WHEREAS, the agreement will not be written until the funding has been scheduled and obligated.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board approves Key No. 20513, US-12, Clearwater River Memorial Bridge, Nez Perce County to exceed the \$1 million agreement authorization up to \$2,531,000.

Request to increase agreement authorization for the I-90, Osburn to Wallace and I-90, Big Creek projects. State Design Engineer Monica Crider presented the request for professional services agreement authorization for the I-90, Osburn to Wallace and I-90, Big Creek projects by HDR Engineering. The phased project is to remove the existing deteriorated concrete pavement and replace with new asphalt. Phase I was completed in 2023 and Phase 2 will be done in 2024. With the current agreement (\$755,777) the total cost extended agreement cost is \$1,861,000.

Member Thompson made a motion, seconded by Member Hoff, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, Board Policy 4001 requires the Transportation Board to approve professional services agreements that exceed \$1 million; and

WHEREAS, District 1 will administer this project; and

WHEREAS, the funding is available and obligated for these services.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board approves Key No. 20684, I-90, Osburn to W. Wallace, Shoshone County, and Key No. 22772, I-90, Big Creek to MP 58.5, Shoshone County to exceed the \$1 million agreement authorization up to \$1,861,000.

<u>Lunch with the Aeronautics Advisory Board (AAB)</u>. The Board recessed to have an informal joint lunch session with the AAB.

Aeronautics Advisory Board (AAB) and Division of Aeronautics annual updates. AAB Chairman John Blakely reported on Leading Idaho and Idaho First priorities, commercial air service, flight operations, and backcountry safety. Some highlights included many of the Lead Idaho projects are in the planning stage with each of the primary airports receiving \$1 million. The AAB is looking into industry best practices on flight operations and the opportunity to use simulator training towards credited flight hours. Due to limited grant funding for web cameras, staff is pursuing co-location opportunities with State Communications to install high level cameras for in-route weather safety conditions.

Aeronautics Administrator Thomas Mahoney provided an update on the Division of Aeronautics administration, flight operations, airport projects, Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) program, airfield management, safety and education, and search and rescue activities. Some highlights included a new performance metric was established based on the average aircraft fatal accident rate over 5-years, which is currently 2.71. Through the efforts of a new employee, the aircraft registration process was reduced by two months. In 2023, the total flight hours for ITD's three state planes was 411 – noting, most of those hours were operated by one pilot. AA Mahoney expressed the need to fill the two vacant pilot positions. Staff inspects 40 airfields annually. The Idaho Airport Aid Program's base budget is \$1 million. Aeronautics also received \$6.4 million in Leading Idaho funds and \$35 million in Idaho First funding. In 2023, a research project was established for the UAS program leveraging partnerships amongst ITD's divisions and the formation of a UAS committee to review policy and flight operations. Aeronautics manages 32 backcountry airstrips providing access to recreation and firefighting efforts. AA Mahoney provided an update on projects completed, maintenance performed, and future work planned. Staff spent 84 hours supporting search and rescue efforts. In 2023, there were 34 accidents with four fatalities.

Member Hoff commented he would like to see web cam coverage of the runway to help assess surface conditions.

In response to Vice Chair DeLorenzo's question regarding funding for web cams, AAB Chairman Blakely stated it would be expensive. AA Mahoney offered they are researching funding opportunities with ITD's 511 program.

<u>Executive Session on Legal and Personnel Issues</u>. Vice Chair DeLorenzo made a motion to meet in executive session at 1:50 PM to discuss issues as authorized in Idaho Code Section 74-206 (b) and in Idaho Code Section 74-206 (f). Member Thompson seconded the motion and it passed unanimously by roll call vote.

The executive session discussion pertained to department operations on legal and personnel matters.

Administrative settlement over \$200,000. Right of Way Manager Justin Pond presented an administrative settlement for KN22165, Project No. A020(165) US20/26, I-84 to Middleton Road, Canyon County, Parcel 54.

Vice Chair DeLorenzo made a motion, seconded by Member Bulger, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department is acquiring right-of-way along ITB24-04 US 20/26, I-84 to Middleton Rd., for Project No. A022(165); and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department and the property owner have engaged in good faith negotiations; and

WHEREAS, both parties agree that additional payment is justified in order for the Idaho Transportation Department to fairly compensate the property owner of Parcel 54.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Idaho Transportation Board approves an Administrative Settlement over \$200,000.00.

Administrative settlement over \$200,000. Right of Way Manager Justin Pond presented an administrative settlement for KN22715, Project No. A022(715) SH-55, Farmway Road to Middleton Road, Canyon County Parcels 14 and 15.

Vice Chair DeLorenzo made a motion, seconded by Member Osborn, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department is acquiring right-of-way along ITB24-05 SH-55, Farmway Rd. to Middleton Rd., Canyon County, for Project No. A022(715); and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department and the property owner have engaged in good faith negotiations; and

Background Information

The Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) delegated the administration of the Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP) to the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council (LHTAC) in 2022. However, ITD retained several oversight responsibilities of the program as required by federal regulations or adopted policies. The oversight responsibilities include consent of the application and scoring procedures to ensure compliance with federal regulations. LHTAC has completed the biannual application period for the program and is reporting to ITD the results.

LHTAC Council approved an application period for TAP to award approximately \$15 million in funding (two program years) to eligible applicants. This application period closed on January 18th, 2024 with 35 applications requesting a total of \$14.9 million in federal funds (\$13.5 million in infrastructure and \$1.4 million in non-infrastructure). LHTAC staff has reviewed all the applications for eligibility, completeness, and accuracy. All applications submitted in the 2024 cycle are eligible and complete. LHTAC staff recommends moving forward with the administrative steps to fund all projects without scoring. Projects will be targeted for FFY 2026, 2027 and 2028 based on project schedules. Staff has conducted administrative discussions with ITD Planning Services and the Federal Highway Administration on moving forward on funding all applications without scoring. Both agencies gave administrative approval on this action by reviewing the federal guidance and LHTAC's adherence to the guidance. On February 1, 2024 the LHTAC Executive Council approved a staff recommendation to move forward with funding all applications without scoring. All infrastructure projects have gone through a multi step review process involving ITD and LHTAC staff. Applicants are required to submit a pre-application (with cost estimate) and environmental review prior to submitting their application. The pre-application is reviewed and signed-off by either an LHTAC or ITD staff. The environmental review is conducted by an LHTAC staff member. Comments are returned to the applicant prior to final submission of their application. After applications are submitted, an LHTAC engineer does the final review on projects to ensure they are good candidates for successful project delivery. The non-infrastructure applications also receive a review process. This is to ensure the applicant has identified key staff and that they are qualified to perform the education & encouragement activities outlined in the application.

LHTAC now seeks the Idaho Transportation Board approval of advancing in the application process. This does not add the projects to the Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP). LHTAC will



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use the Board's consent affirming the application process as indication to enter the projects into the draft ITIP when ITD conducts its annual update process.

A list of the applications and their funding requests is attached to this staff report. TAP projects are sorted by infrastructure and non-infrastructure categories of projects.

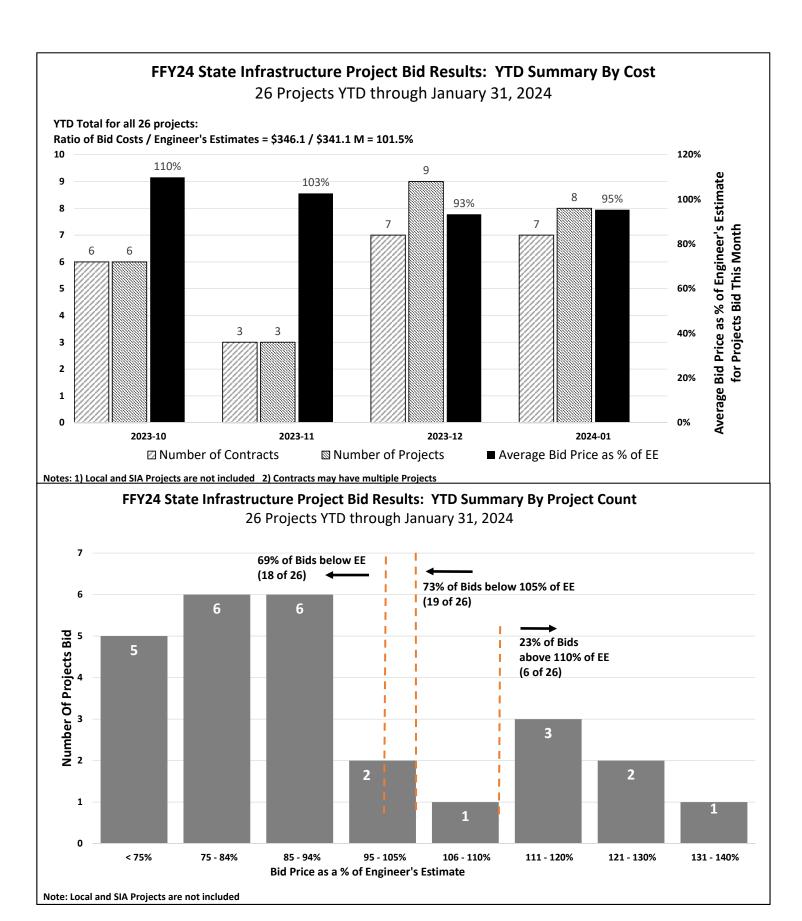

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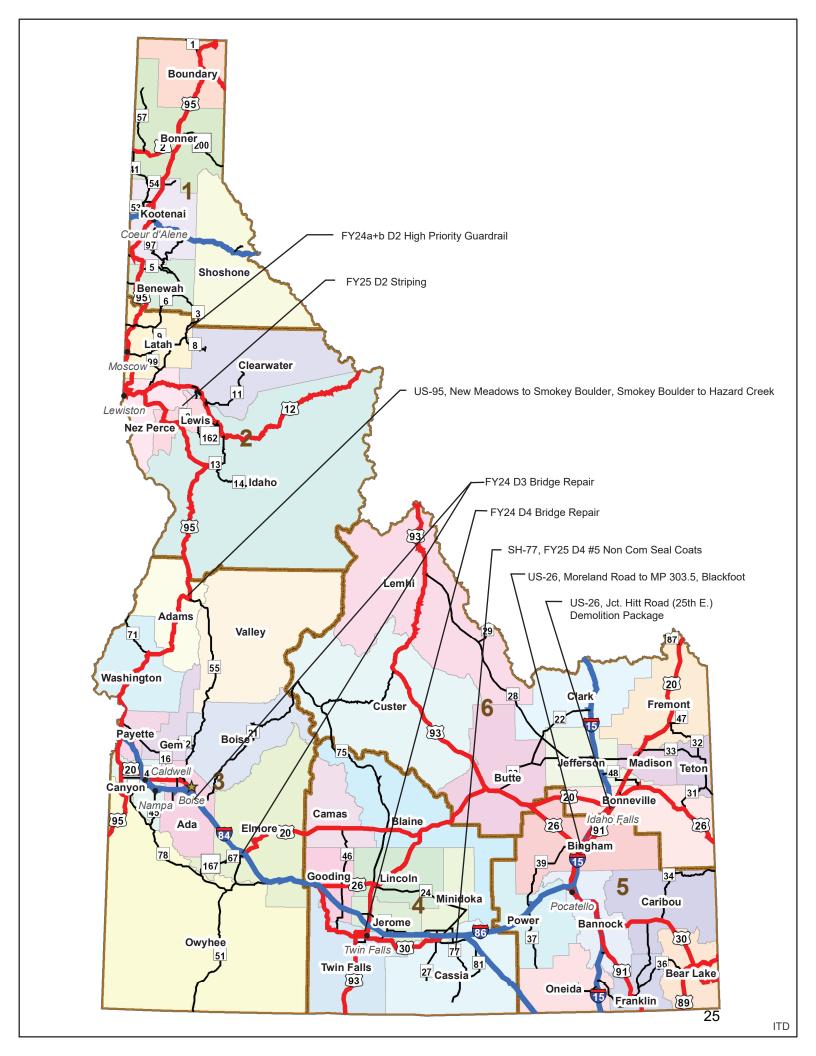

Obligation authority through March 1st is \$222.4 million. This includes \$35.2 million of *Highway Infrastructure General Funds* carried over from FY21 through FY23, and \$45 million *IIJA Bridge formula* (General Fund) *funds*. These General Funds are also included in the apportionments detailed below.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) was signed on November 15, 2021. Additional apportionments were allocated via the Appropriations Act. Idaho received apportionments of \$475.8 million. FY24 obligation authority through 3/1/24 is 46.7% of apportionments.

Background Information

July 01, 2023 thru December 31, 2023, Fiscal Year 2024 Financial Statements

The financial operations of the Department as of December 31, 2023, six months through this fiscal year.

- Revenues to the State Highway Account from all state sources as shown on the financial statements are ahead of forecast by 6.5% (this includes Misc. Revenues and Equipment Buy Back). Revenues in the Highway Distribution Account, Fuels/Registration Direct, and Ethanol are also ahead of forecast (5.4%).
- State revenues to the State Aeronautics Fund are currently below of forecast by -5.4% or \$-91.9K. The revenue for both the State Highway Account, and the State Aeronautics Fund will continue to be monitored closely.
- Expenditures are within planned budgets YTD. The differences after six months are timing between planned and actual expenditures plus encumbrances. Personnel costs have savings of \$2.9M or 4% is due to vacancies and timing between a position becoming vacant and filled. Management is working diligently to keep vacancies as low as possible.
- Contract construction cash expenditures in the State Highway Account for July December of this fiscal year are \$382.9M. Compared to the last three fiscal years through the first six months of the year:
 - o FY23= \$269.0M
 - o FY22= \$243.1M
 - o FY21= \$269.1M

It is important to note that contract construction projects are funded from a total of five different funds. The State Highway Account, Strategic Initiatives Program Fund, Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund (TECM), TECM Bond Proceeds and GARVEE Bond Proceeds. The total construction expenditures for the first six months from these funding sources was \$621.6M or \$158.4M higher than the highest point of the previous three years.

- o FY23= \$463.2M
- o FY22= \$314.7M
- o FY21= \$328.7M

The balance of the long-term investments as of the end of December is \$180.9M. These funds are obligated against both construction projects and encumbrances. The long-term investments plus the cash balance (\$107.6M) totals \$288.5M.

Expenditures in the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund (GF Surplus), for the first six months, are \$83.2M. This is the fund where the Governor's "Leading Idaho" transfer of \$181.7M completed in July was deposited. There are no additional receipts other than interest earned to date of \$1.0M based on the cash balance.

Deposits into the Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund of \$59.3M is the first six months of the sales tax of 4.5%. Initial receipts into this fund for FY24 of \$37.3M is committed to debt service on the TECM Bonds. Expenditures in this fund for construction expenses on projects were \$14.7M.

As part of the CARES Act in 2020, ITD received a federal grant from the Federal Transit Administration of \$27.3M. The first three years of expenditures for this was \$14.3M. The expenses during the first six of FY24 was \$2.6M, for a total expenditure of \$16.9M since the beginning of the grant.

Expenditures from the two active bond programs were \$123.0M for the TECM Capital Projects fund and \$21.8M for the GARVEE Capital Projects fund. Both programs are very active and advancing as planned.

Background Information

The purpose of this board item is to inform the board of notable FY24 cost savings and increases, the advertisement of projects identified for the \$20 million FY24 State holdback, an update about the \$30 million reserve, and to request advancement of several prioritized FY25 paving projects in FY24.

<u>Update on Notable FY2024 Cost Savings and Increases (Informational)</u>

There are constant adjustments to costs throughout the year on projects in the Program. As a means to ensure transparency, ITD staff want to make sure the board is aware of how these funds are being used.

Cost increases and decreases result from a number of sources. Cost increases can include items such as adjustment of engineer's estimates prior to advertisement, construction change orders that exceed the standard five percent contingency, supplementals for consultant services agreements, and increased cost for right-of-way acquisition. Cost decreases can result from bids being received that are lower than the engineer's estimate, closing out prior year projects, and release of unexpended development funds at award. Program increases and decreases more than \$400,000 on projects through January 30th are provided in Attachments 1, 2, and 3.

Thirty-four of the FY24 projects have already been advertised, which have opened at 99.8% of the engineer's estimate, with the sum of the low bids totaling \$230 million. Of the remaining projects programmed in FY24, there are 21 more to advertise with a budgeted construction value of \$97 million. For reference, Attachment 4 summarizes projects remaining to open bids as of February 2, 2024.

Advertisement of the FY2024 State Holdback Projects (Informational)

At the beginning of the fiscal year, the department presented to the board a financial management strategy that would be implemented in case state revenue didn't come in as forecasted. This is referred to as a "holdback", meaning a set of projects were identified to be held for advertisement in the latter half of the fiscal year if revenues were received as forecast. Bid opening trends, along with strong revenues for this fiscal year, give the department confidence the six projects identified for the FY24 \$20 million holdback (shown in Attachment 5), which are already programmed in the ITIP, can be scheduled for advertisement and bid opening.

FY2024 Reserve Plan (Informational)

In June 2023, an item was presented to the board identifying \$30 million of FY24 State Highway System (SHS) "reserve funds", which was set aside for potential market increases and project budget adjustments. The department has been monitoring market conditions and forecasts have been presented to the board on a quarterly basis, which currently indicate some stability and predictability in the market.



This is for information only and no action is needed at this time, however, utilization of these funds will be presented to the board as part of the department's end-of-year plan.

FY2024 Funding Priorities and FY2025 Project Advancements (Action)

With revenues coming in higher than initially forecast and market conditions showing improved stability, FY24 is currently under-programmed by approximately \$17 million. This amount, along with approximately \$19 million from statewide balancing actions (which is subject to constant change), is available to advance projects or cover project increases, which will allow the development and construction of these identified FY25 projects to begin construction as much as one year early. This action not only provides an opportunity to advance projects and start construction sooner but also provides an avenue to balance the FY25 program which is currently over-programmed. A list of prioritzed projects is included in Attachment 6 and will be funded in the order listed. Overall funding availability will be monitored as further statewide balancing continues and will be applied to the effort of advancing these projects.

Recommendations (Action items require a resolution)

Utilization of unprogrammed FY24 funds along with identified statewide balancing funds to advance FY25 projects and cover FY24 funding priorities as referenced in the Resolution on page 69.

In July 2019, through Request for Proposal (RFP), Ardurra was selected to provide design services from preliminary to Plans, Specifications and Estimate (PS&E), including Right of Way (ROW) plans, utilitity plans, design survey, and pathway plans. The project design services were split into two phases. Phase I was for the Preliminary Design and was negotiated at \$402,647. Phase II was for Intermediate Design through PS&E and was negotiated at \$660,701.

In April 2021, the Board authorized agreement amount for Phase I and II Design for \$1,300,000.

Due to unforeseen environmental document delays and impacts due to development along SH-44 resulted in additional survey and design work including adjusting roadway and pathway alignments, drainage designs, etc., a supplemental is needed. Ardurra is also likely to be retained for engineer of record (EOR) services during construction. EOR services will be negotiated under a separate agreement as the project approaches the construction phase.

The negotiated cost of the Phase II Supplemental services is approximately \$269,000 and estimated cost of EOR services is approximately \$150,000. These services will bring the total cost of services to approximately \$1,482,348. This is approximately 7% of the programmed construction funding.

Currently, there is \$1,200,000 obligated. District 3 has identified \$270,000 to cover the supplemental agreement work. EOR funds will be addressed via future program updates. No agreement will be written without enough obligated funding.

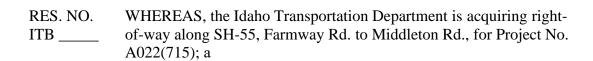

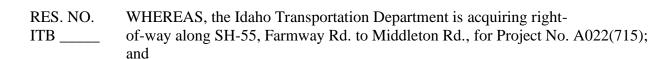

The Engineer's Estimate and quantities for S904-05A Special Provision (SP) Temporary Traffic Control was based on the average unit price index for similar projects and on observation of past experience with similar projects. On review of the itemized breakdown Engineer's Estimate for Item S904-05A SP Temporary Traffic Control it was determined that a couple of traffic control items and quantities were missed. Including the missed items, it increases the Engineers Estimate Lump Sum (LS) cost. Also within the variability of the implementation of LS Temporary Traffic Control, there is an inherent risk to the contractor that was not accounted for in the Engineers Estimate.

Item S914-05B SP Aggregate for Chip Seal was estimated at \$225 based on one previous recent similar project's unit pricing. As we have a single source of bid data that we can use for the representation of this work it may account for the variance in pricing from what was estimated in our Engineers Estimate.

This project addresses a significant deficiency in the roadways in which the treatment for some of these segments have been overdue for more than 2 years.

The estimated prices for these pay items were obtained from recent similar projects; however, these are both specialty items and there exist few similar examples from ITD projects.

The Temporary Work Bridge item was bid at a higher lump sum than the Engineer's Estimate. This is likely due to the innate variability of a contractor-designed item, project work window, environmental constraints, and the need for different possible configurations.

The Bridge Precast Deck Panels bid at a higher unit price than the Engineer's Estimate. This is a specialty item with limited bid history in Idaho, and is necessary to expedite the construction schedule and ensure that Interstate traffic will be maintained during the winter months. Only one supplier in the region has the ability to manufacture these panels.

This project addresses significant structural deficiencies in these Interstate bridges. The bridges are currently rated as "fair" condition and delaying restoration efforts would allow for continued deterioration.

District 1 does not believe that re-bidding of the project will result in significantly lower bids and recommends that this project be awarded to begin in the 2024 construction season.

Where the project proposes to elevate and construct new underpasses at the I-86 freeway, as owned by ITD, we hereby commit to be a Coalition Partner in support of the project and intend to enter into a Memorandum of Agreement by July 1, 2024 per the Notice of Funding Opportunity (EPA-R-OAR-CPRGI-23-07). As noted in the NOFO, the MOA will be between the Coalition Partners: the City of Pocatello and Idaho Transportation Department. Further, the MOA will delineate the roles, responsibilities, and commitments of each partner to achieve the project goals, objectives, and target outputs. The City of Pocatello will be the Lead Applicant and ITD will be a Coalition Partner. The MOA will further detail the operating model and resources we will commit including any technical expertise, project management, and staff time. We understand that we will be accountable to the lead applicant for proper use of EPA funding and successful project implementation and that the Lead Applicant will be accountable to EPA and fully responsible for effectively carrying out the full scope of work and financial management of the grant.

In addition, we would like to take this opportunity to offer our support for the application. The transload facility at the Pocatello Regional Airport will allow for substantial reductions in GHG emissions through the new opportunities to deliver freight and commodities by rail instead of heavy-duty vehicles. Further, the project will see emissions reductions through potential time travel savings, reduced vehicle idle time, and traffic reductions along interstates. This application will drastically improve quality of life throughout the project area as well as align with ITD's goals to improve interstate infrastructure as well as improve safety, mobility, and economic opportunity for roadway users.

Background Information

The U.S. Census Bureau revises urban areas every 10 years based on population counts from the decennial census. FHWA gives state DOTs the opportunity to adjust and revise these boundaries to be more consistent with transportation planning needs. Urban Area Boundary (UAB) designations are critical to many federal transportation and funding programs and support the determination of Federal-Aid eligibility for roadways, bridge, and transit funding. This applies to urban areas with a population of 5,000 or have a housing unit density of 2,000.

Section 101 of Title 23, U.S. Code) defines an urban area as follows: "The term 'urban area' means, an urbanized area or, in the case of the urbanized area encompassing more than one State, that part of the urbanized area, within boundaries to be fixed by the place designated by the Bureau of the Census."

For transportation purposes, Cities/Counties/MPOs have the option to use the census—defined urban boundaries exclusively or adjust the census-defined boundaries to be more consistent with transportation needs. ITD, in coordination with local planning partners, may adjust the UABs so fringe areas having "...residential, commercial, industrial, and/or national defense significance" be included; with FHWA having final decision on proposed boundary.

Reasons for adjusting urban boundaries for transportation planning purposes often relate to a need for consistency or geographic continuity; to provide for an orderly and efficient transition from rural to urban land use, to accommodate urban population and employment growth, to ensure efficient use of land, and to provide for livable communities.

Key programs impacted by UAB designations include:

- Surface Transportation Block Grant Program (STBG)
- Local Agency Programs (LAP), i.e., Transportation Alternative Programs (TAP) programs
- Federal Transit Administration Apportionments (FTA)
- National Highway System (NHS)
- Transportation Management Areas (TMAs)
- Metropolitan Planning Organizations (MPOs)

UAB adjustment schedule:

- January 2024, Establish the UAB adjustment Team (Districts, Urban Areas, MPOs)
- Feb-May 2024, Adjustment Teams work to update UAB
- Jun 2024, UAB Teams submit GIS files/maps to ITD HQs for review
- Jun 2024, ITD submits GIS files/maps to FHWA for review
- Jul 2024, ITD Board presentation and approval
- Aug 2024, Inforporate AUB changes into enterprise system(s)
