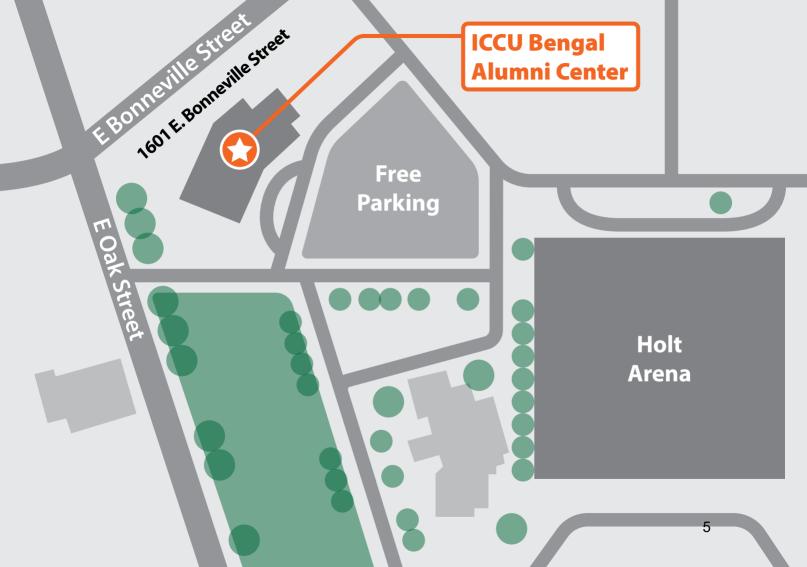

REGULAR MEETING IDAHO TRANSPORTATION BOARD

March 30, 2024

The Idaho Transportation Board met at 8:30 AM on Wednesday, March 20, 2024, in Boise, Idaho. The following principals were present: James R. Thompson, Member – District 1 Gary Osborn, Member – District 2 Julie DeLorenzo, Vice Chair (Presiding Chair) - District 3 Mitch Watkins, Member – District 4 John Bulger, Member – District 5 Bob Hoff, Member – District 6 Scott Stokes, Director Chief Deputy/Chief Operations Officer Dan McElhinney Lorraine Dennis, Business Executive to the Board Tim Thomas, Deputy Attorney General

Chairman Moad was absent.

<u>Safety Share</u>. Acting Policy Manager Sara Anderson reported on the safety importance of DMV's motor vehicle inspectors as they travel to perform their duties. Some measures taken to ensure safety include sharing schedules and reporting when out of cell phone range.

<u>Board Minutes</u>. Member Bulger made a motion to approve the minutes of February 21, 2024, seconded by Member Hoff, and the motion passed unanimously.

Board Meeting Dates. The next meeting is April 17 – 18, 2024, in Pocatello.

<u>Consent Items</u>. Member Hoff made a motion, seconded by Member Thompson, and passed unopposed, to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO.WHEREAS, consent calendar items are to be routine, non-controversial, self-ITB24-22explanatory items that can be approved in one motion; and

WHEREAS, Idaho Transportation Board members have the prerogative to remove items from the consent calendar for questions or discussion.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board approves the Trucking Advisory Council reappointments for District 1, District 4 and Chairman, and the contracts for award.

1) Trucking Advisory Council, District 1 reappointment. Per Board Policy 4042, the DMV administrator recommends the reappointment of District 1 Member Frank Buell to the TAC for the term January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2027.

2) Trucking Advisory Council, District 4 reappointment. Per Board Policy 4042, the DMV administrator recommends the reappointment of District 4 Member Kevin Iverson to the TAC for the term January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2027.

3) Trucking Advisory Council, Chairman reappointment. Per Board Policy 4042, the DMV administrator recommends the reappointment of John Pocock as Chairman of the TAC for the term January 1, 2024 – December 31, 2027.

4) Contract awards. The low bids on the following projects are more than ten percent over the engineer's estimate, requiring justification. KN#20383, 6th Street, S. Fork CDA River Bridge, LHTAC(1): contractor: Apollo Inc. for \$3,788,755.07. KN#21843 SIA, FY24 interstate striping, District 4: contractor: Clear Zone Construction for \$999,645.00.

Informational Items.

1) Contract awards and advertisements. There were eight ITD and zero Local contracts awarded requiring no action from the Board for February 2024. Year-to-date, from October 1, 2023 to February 29, 2024, 41 ITD and 11 Local contracts were bid, of which nine ITD and five Local contracts requiring Board approval were awarded.

The list of projects currently under advertisement was provided.

2) Professional services agreements and term agreement work tasks report. From January 29, 2024 to February 25, 2024, 36 new professional services agreements and work tasks were processed, totaling \$13,991,506. Seven supplemental agreements totaling \$4,795,943 to existing professional services agreements were processed during this period.

3) Monthly report of federal formula program funding through March 6th. Idaho received \$222.4 million in obligation authority (OA) through March 1, 2024 via a continuing resolution. It includes \$35.2 million of Highway Infrastructure General Funds and \$45 million in Bridge Formula funds. FY24 OA through March 1st is 46.7% of apportionments. Allotted program funding is \$238.9 million with \$160.2 million remaining as of March 6th.

4) Non-construction contract awards. Per Board Policy 4001 that requires reporting nonconstruction professional service agreements executed in the previous month, there were none to report.

5) State Fiscal Year 2024 financial statement. Revenues to the State Highway Account (SHA) from all state sources as of January 31 are ahead of forecast by 4.9% and revenues in the Highway Distribution Account are up 3.9%. State revenues to the State Aeronautics Fund are below forecast by 2.9%. The Department's expenditures were within planned budgets. Personnel costs savings of \$3.3 million is due to vacancies and timing. Contract construction cash expenditures in the SHA are \$414.8M, and total construction expenditures from the five different funds sources total \$672.6M.

The balance of the long-term investments is \$181.4M as of the end of January. These funds are obligated against construction projects and encumbrances. The cash balance is \$98.1M. Expenditures in the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund is \$96.9M. Deposits into the Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund is \$70M. The Federal CARES Act provided \$27.3M for public transportation. FY24 expenditures are \$2.7M. Expenditures for the TECM bond program during this period is \$136.6M and \$23.5M for GARVEE.

<u>Board's Policies Subcommittee Report.</u> Subcommittee Chairman Gary Osborn reported the Policies Subcommittee met yesterday afternoon to discuss proposed changes to the department's Aeronautics Advisory Board policies. The subcommittee supports staff's recommendations with revisions and the policies will be brought before the full Board for consideration.

Director's Monthly Report. Director Stokes reported on ITD's 50-year old White Bird Bridge, TECM bonding history and project status, work zone awareness and the I-84, SH-16 Interchange project. Some highlights included the 811-foot White Bird Bridge was constructed in 1975 and marked a critical transportation link between northern and southern Idaho. Last year, a preservation project was completed on the iconic bridge. The third TECM bond sale occurred on March 14 at 3.96% rate and will go towards another 86 miles of reconstructed or added lane miles. Projects from bond sales 1 and 2 are well into construction with estimated completion dates ranging from 2024 to 2027. Construction payout is \$670 million, which is far ahead of last year's \$490 million. As projects advance, the traveling public will see major progress on several big projects statewide. Most projects from the latest bond sale 3 will be a continuation of work from the previous bond sales and are scheduled to be bid this spring and summer. Construction on the Burley and Heyburn interchanges are underway. The department is continuously delivering on its project commitments. Director Stokes announced National Work Zone Awareness Week begins April 15 and the department is taking a proactive approach to safety. He concluded by sharing a video clip of girders made locally that will be used for the I-84, SH-16 Interchange.

Member Bulger complemented staff on the video quality and suggested they be credited on these in-house produced videos.

Legislative Update. Government Affairs Manager Colby Cameron stated the Joint Finance Appropriation Committee (JFAC) finished its budgeting setting March 15. The legislative session is anticipated to wrap up by March 29. ITD's budget setting was March 1 and 8. Staff is tracking about 45 bills. Some highlights on those bills included HB534, electric vehicle fees - stalled in committee; HCR24, traffic corridor study highways 55, 16 and 95 - return to committee; SB1261, telework - stalled in committee; and HB638, transportation local grant program - a policy bill was written redirecting program administration to LHTAC (no new funding was designated). In response to Member Bulger's question regarding ITD's State Street property and decisions on where the department will reside, GAM Cameron replied the legislature thought it important to hold onto the State St. property; however, final decisions are still pending.

<u>FY2025 Appropriation Request – JFAC Recommendation.</u> Financial Services Manager Dan Hansen reviewed the department's FY25 appropriation request highlighting changes from JFAC's actions. The District 4 (\$9.6 million) relocation was not funded and the Headquarters relocation request was reduced to \$32.5 million and redirected for the HQ State Street office bring the total capital facilities enhancements to \$48 million. Six million was also not funded for the HQ relocation (furnishing). Highway Operations enhancements for 53 new positions funding level was reduced by \$821,500. The following items were added for contract construction and right of way enhancements: \$123.6 million for road and bridge maintenance (General Fund transfer Idaho Works), \$58.08 million for transportation safety, and \$200 million for local bridge maintenance. The FY25 total appropriation is \$1.37 billion with 1,645 positions. Total FY25 program funding with bond debt service is \$1.47 billion.

In response to Madame Chair's question about how the \$32.5 million was determined for the HQ State Street rehabilitation, Chief Administrative Officer stated it was from the Department of Administration's standard based on square footage. Estimates also took into consideration similar recent bids received for the Chinden Campus Building 3 renovation.

<u>Transportation Expansion & Congestion Mitigation (TECM) 2024A Bond Sale Update</u>. Controller Justin Collins reported on the TECM 2024A bond sale that took place on March 14. Some highlights included the department continues to receive strong bond credit ratings. The latest bond reaffirmed an AA+, which is the second highest obtainable credit rating, at an All-In True Interest Cost (TIC) of 3.96%. Proceeds totaling \$372 million is anticipated to close March 27. In comparison to the two previous TECM bond sales, the All-in TIC continues to be under 4% - 2022A (3.55%) and 2023A (3.79%). Accumulated proceeds total \$988 million with \$62.13 million in debt service.

In response to Member Bulger's question regarding an option of splitting the bond of \$400 million into two sales, Controller Collins affirmed the Board did approved a bond sale amount up to \$400 million and there were no market indications that two bond sales would be needed or advantageous, but the department rolled back to \$372 million based on project readiness. Remaining bond capacity will be evaluated later in the year to determine when best to pursue another bond sale.

<u>Contract Award for TECM Construction Projects.</u> TECM Engineering Manager Shawna King presented the request for an exception to Board Policy 4001 that requires Board approval for bids more than \$2 million above the engineer's estimate (EE). Bids that exceed 110% of the EE will still be presented to the Board for approval or rejection. The projects are as noted in the resolution below.

Member Osborn made a motion, seconded by Member Thompson, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, Board Policy 4001 indicates the Board shall approve the justification

ITB24-23 for award or rejection of contracts when the bid exceeds the engineer's estimate by more than ten percent (10%) or for bids that exceed the engineer's estimate by more than \$2 million; and

WHEREAS, three Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation (TECM) projects will be advertised for construction, with bids opened Spring/Summer 2024; and

WHEREAS, the estimated cost of these three TECM projects are substantial, ranging between \$65 million and \$105 million; and

WHEREAS, it is in the interest of the Department to expedite award of these construction projects; and

WHEREAS, this requested exception to Board Policy 4001 allows flexibility to expedite the award process while providing adequate controls for presenting approve or reject justifications to the Board if the bids are greater than 110% of the engineer's construction estimate.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board allows an exception to Board Policy 4001 to remove the \$2 million justification threshold amount for the following three TECM funded projects:

I-15, Northgate to Fort Hall, North I-15, Northgate to Fort Hall, South SH-16, SH-44 Interchange

<u>CD McElhinney Introduced the New Highway Division Administrator.</u> Highway Division Administrator of Engineering Services Michael Johnson thanked executive staff and the Board for the opportunity to serve. He will remain as the State's bridge engineering, among his other duties, and is in the process of hiring an assistant bridge engineer.

<u>Request to Approve Consultant Agreements.</u> CD McElhinney stated in response to the Board's request to simplify the consultant agreement approval process, staff is presenting a new consolidated approach. The board agenda item provides the standard background information that includes a table of proposed agreements footnoted with the four types of agreements, and a justification memo for each project from the representing district engineer.

State Design Engineer Monica Crider presented the request for consultant agreement authorization. The projects, as shown in the resolution, are: US-95, Thorn Creek to Moscow by HMH, LLC; SH-53, Pleasant View Interchange by HDR Engineering, I-15B, UPRR, S. Blackfoot Interchange by David Evans and Associates; and US-93, Perrine Bridge repair by Burgess & Niple.

In response to Member Bulger's concerns about approving multiple agreements, Madame Chair, clarified that the Board still has the prerogative to remove any project agreement from the resolution.

Member Thompson made a motion, seconded by Member Osborn, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO. WHEREAS, Board Policy 4001 requires the Idaho Transportation Board to

ITB24-24 authorize professional services agreements greater than \$1,000,000 and each subsequent cost increase, work task agreements greater than \$500,000, cumulative work task agreements on a project greater than \$1,500,000, and consultant two-year work task agreements total greater than \$1,500,000; and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Board has been provided details about each project requesting authorization; and

WHEREAS, funding will be committed to this agreement before it is executed.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Board hereby grants the authority for professional service agreement(s) as noted in the following table:

<u>Administrative settlement over \$200,000.</u> Right of Way Manager Justin Pond presented an administrative settlement for KN22715, Project No. A022(715) SH-55, Farmway Road to Middleton Road, Canyon County, Parcels 157 and 158.

Member Hoff made a motion, seconded by Member Bulger, and passed unopposed to approve the following resolution:

RES. NO.WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department is acquiring right-of-way alongITB24-25SH-55, Farmway Rd. to Middleton Rd., for Project No. A022(715); and

WHEREAS, the Idaho Transportation Department and the property owner have engaged in good faith negotiations; and

WHEREAS, both parties agree that additional payment is justified in order for the Idaho Transportation Department to fairly compensate the property owner of Parcels 157 and 158.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Idaho Transportation Board approves an Administrative Settlement over \$200,000 for the right-of-way acquisition along SH-55, Farmway Rd. to Middleton Rd., for Project No. A022(715), KN 22715, Parcels 157 and 158.

Background Information

The purpose of this consent item is to request approval to amend one transit project in FY2024, per policy 5011 Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP), and at the request of the COMPASS and the sponsor Valley Regional Transit (VRT).

The Transit - Rolling Stock, Infrastructure, and Technology, Boise Area, VRT – FY2024 project funds capital replacement projects, such as rolling stock (public transportation related vehicles), infrastructure, and technology, identified in the Transit Asset Management (TAM) Plan in FY2024 in the Boise Urbanized Area. The project is funded with the annual appropriations from Surface Transportation Block Grant – Transportation Management Area (STBG-TMA) funds.

The FY2024 project cost is \$2,445,000. The federal portion of \$1,956,000 is from STBG-TMA funding and the local match of \$489,000 will be paid by Valley Regional Transit. This is an overall project increase of \$1,105,000 from what is in the approved FY24-30 ITIP. This increase is to cover software needs and cost overruns on a construction project on the Orchard Transit facility.

In order to increase these funds, they are utilizing funding that was previously unprogrammed and available funding left over from other projects.

COMPASS has updated their Transportation Improvement Program to add the funds for this project.

Staff requests approval to amend this project as detailed above in the approved FY24-30 ITIP.

Recommendations (Action items require a resolution)

Approve the amendment of the Transit - Rolling Stock, Infrastructure, and Technology, Boise Area, VRT – FY2024 project for a total cost of \$2,445,000.

Background Information

The purpose of this consent item is to request approval to make adjustments to the Rail-Highway Crossing Program, per Policy 5011 Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP) and Policy 5085 Rail-Highway Crossing Program by prioritizing available funding on 1) project advancements, 2) unforeseen cost increases due to change in standards or conditions and/or 3) minor (or emergency) safety enhancements or experimental features at public rail highway crossings.

<u>Add New:</u> Request addition of a new project Rail Signs Upgrade, Washington/Idaho/Montana (WIM) Railway, Latah County to FY2024. The rail sign upgrade is needed as WIM recently purchased from WATCO the operating rights for the old Washington & Idaho Railway. This rail line crosses or has an impact to the routes identified, US-95, SH-6 and SH-9. WIM will service Bennett Lumber in Potlach. This project will be funded by the transfer from KN 24391.

Background Information

At the February 21, 2024, Idaho Transportation Board meeting, the Board approved the recommended list of projects from the most recent Transportation Alternatives Program application. LHTAC staff requests to add two projects to the FY2024-2030 Idaho Transportation Investment Program (ITIP) to begin those projects in FY2024.

The first project is to add a Safe Routes to School project for the Idaho Walk Bike Alliance. They were awarded \$60,000 (plus local match of ~\$5,000) for non-infrastructure safety activities and are able to commence activities immediately. The program also has the funds available to award in FY2024 and this allows for more flexibility on infrastructure project cost in FY2025. The second project is located in the City of Gooding. This project has a total cost of \$500,000 including local match. The funds are available from project cost decreases in FY2024 for design and in FY2026 for construction from available unprogrammed funds. This project will be companioned with a resurfacing project scheduled for construction in FY2026. Starting design in FY2024 is necessary to companion the projects.

The funding for FY2024 for both projects will be offset from a cost decrease on KN23908 Horseshoe Park Pathway, Phase 3. A chart for the program balancing is provided below.

Background Information

Idaho Code 40-719 established the category of investment for "Child pedestrian safety on the state and local system" as a subset of the Strategic Initiatives Program. Since the initial funding year of 2018, the Local Highway Technical Assistance Council (LHTAC) has administered this program and the Idaho Transportation Board (the Board) has exercised oversight by reviewing and approving the scores of the applications submitted to and reviewed by LHTAC.

LHTAC conducted a statewide call for applications from October 2023 to December 2023. LHTAC received 48 eligible applications totaling \$10.9 million in funding requests in the call for applications. The applications were scored by three LHTAC Council members and an LHTAC staff member. The Idaho Transportation Department (ITD) provided oversight on the application and scoring process through the Headquarters Planning and Development Services section. The LHTAC Council approved the attached list of scores at the March 14, 2024 meeting. LHTAC currently has \$1.8 million in state funds to award to projects. However, any additional funding appropriated as a result of the 2024 legislative session will be awarded to projects based on score and as applicable to the enabling legislation.

Additional background on the \$1.8 million LHTAC has to award to Local Highway Jursidictions: Senate Bill 1189, signed into law on March 31, 2023, appropriated \$10 million to the Local Strategic Initiatives Fund for Children Pedestrian Safety (CPS) projects. On April 14, 2023 LHTAC approved a plan to fund the unfunded applications from the 2022 application cycle. The Board reviewed and approved the 2022 list of projects at the July 21, 2022 meeting. The unfunded projects totaled \$8.2 million in awards, leaving \$1.8 million to be awarded through the 2024 funding application.

On March 19, 2024, 2 bids were opened for the above referenced project. The low bid of \$3,373,495.26.01 was 46% higher than the Engineer's estimate. The total difference between the lowest bid and Engineer's estimate is \$1,061,011.09. The two received bids were within 5.5% of each other.

The Engineer's Estimate was based on the average unit price index for similar projects and on observation of past experience with similar projects, but there can be difficulty developing accurate estimates in Valley County. In the average unit price index, there are few nearby projects completed in recent years, making it difficult to estimate accurately.

In addition, cost inflation has occurred in recent years, especially related to material and labor costs. Contributing to cost increases in Valley County, the length of material haul can be difficult to predict due to uncertainty of local sources producing material that meets specifications. The final Engineer's Estimate for bidding was updated in 2023 from final consultant PS&E construction cost estimate delivered in 2022. With the lack of available data for the area in the average unit price index, it appears we were too conservative in accounting for materials price inflation for the final Engineer's Estimate.

We recently reviewed unit prices of a project bid locally by the City of McCall that will be constructed in summer 2024. This information was not available prior to bid of this project. The price comparison of this project to the City's locally bid project shows similar pricing, generally within 10%.

This project is a very high priority within the community. Potholes on the surface of the roadway create a very poor ride experience. Without construction this season, the local sponsor will have to spend significant funds rehabilitating this roadway.

LHTAC has identified the additional funding needed to complete construction and the local sponsor has committed to additional local funds needed for the local match. LHTAC does not believe that re-advertisement will result in lower estimates and recommends award of this contract.

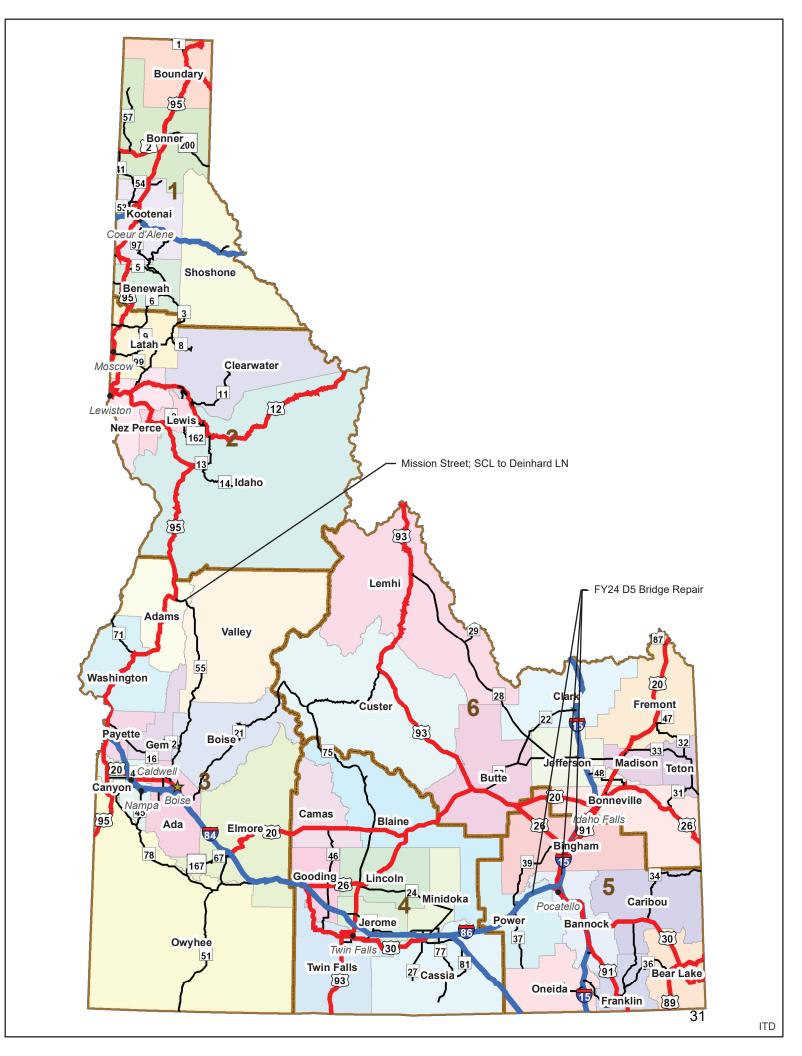

The Engineer's Estimate was based on the average unit price index and past experience with similar projects. Had we considered that part of the project has restricted access over the Railroad we would have increased the concrete, bridge deck drains and bridge removal. Since PS&E, we noticed that bridge repairs have higher mobilization costs and this will be considered on future projects. These considerations should have brought the Engineer's Estimate to within 110% of the low bid.

This project addresses a significant deficiency in multiple bridges and in order to increase the safety of the public, needs to be to be awarded in the 2024 construction season.

The district has obtained additional funds through statewide balancing. The district does not believe that readvertisement will result in lower estimates. The district recommends award of this contract.

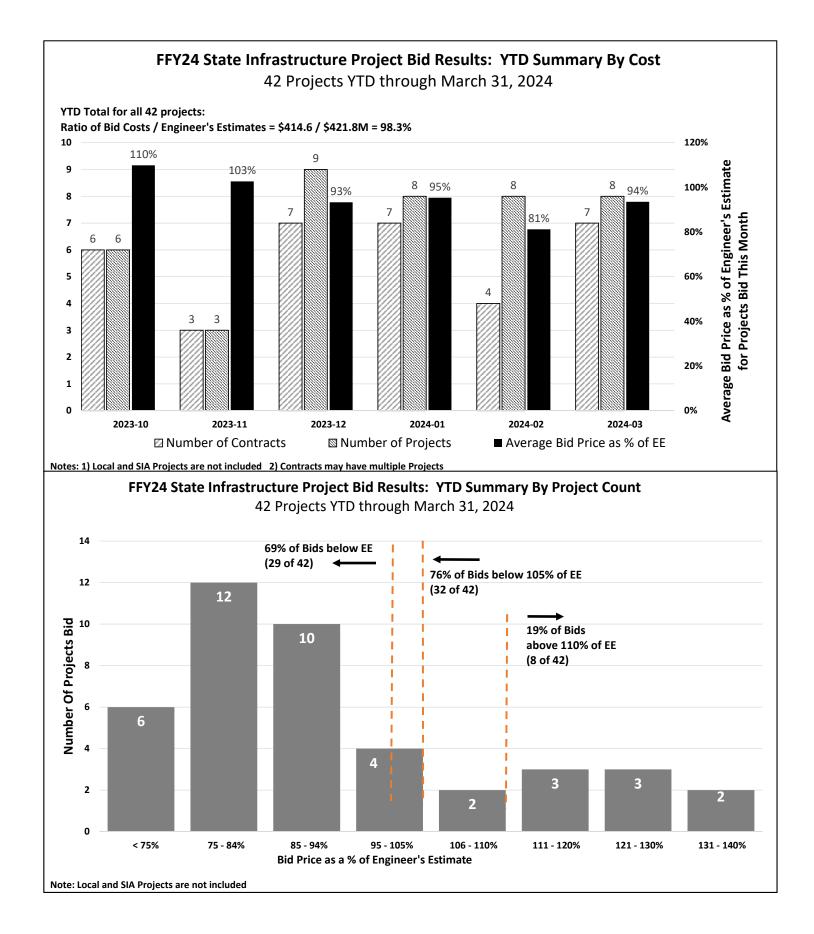

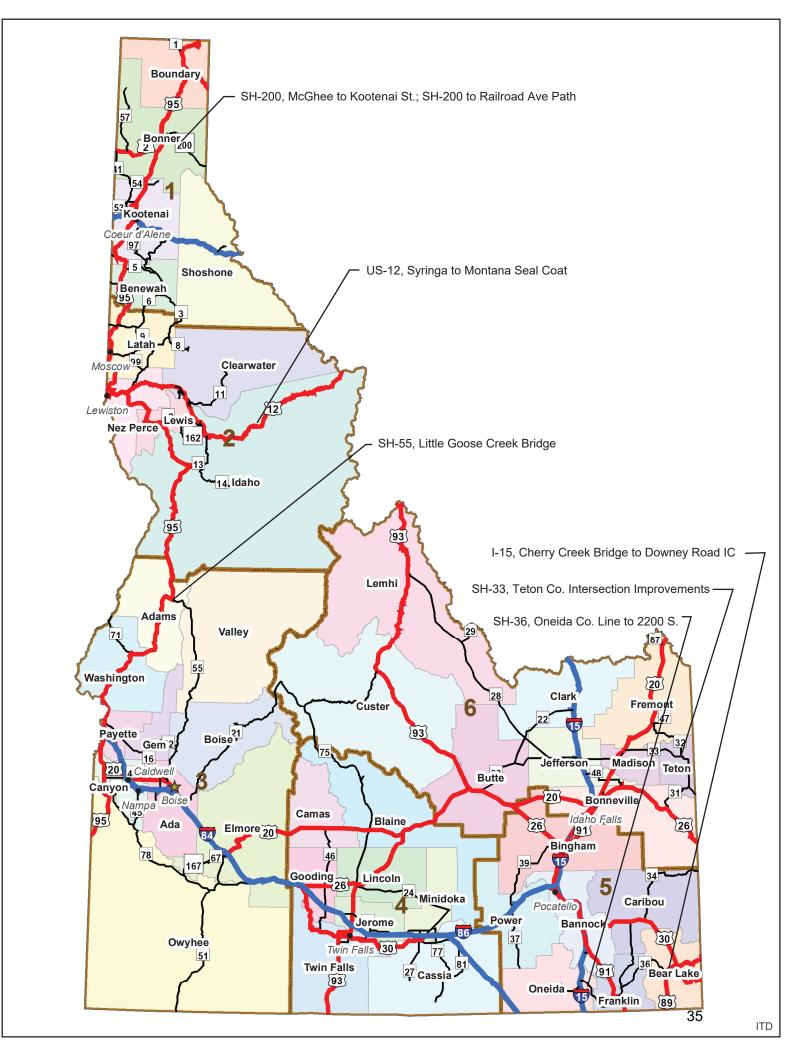

Background Information

Idaho has received obligation authority through 9/30/24.

Obligation authority through September 30 is \$442.9 million. This includes \$35.2 million of *Highway Infrastructure General Funds* carried over from FY21 through FY23, and \$45 million *IIJA Bridge formula* (General Fund) *funds*. These General Funds are also included in the apportionments detailed below.

The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) was signed on November 15, 2021. Additional apportionments were allocated via the Appropriations Act. Idaho received apportionments of \$478.9 million. FY24 obligation authority through 9/30/24 is 88.3% of apportionments.

Background Information

July 01, 2023 thru February 29, 2024, Fiscal Year 2024 Financial Statements

The financial operations of the Department as of February 29, 2024, eight months through this fiscal year.

- Revenues to the State Highway Account from all state sources as shown on the financial statements are ahead of forecast by 4.1% (this includes Misc. Revenues and Equipment Buy Back). Revenues in the Highway Distribution Account, Fuels/Registration Direct, and Ethanol are also ahead of forecast (2.9%).
- State revenues to the State Aeronautics Fund are currently below forecast by -0.6% or \$-11.9K. The revenue for both the State Highway Account, and the State Aeronautics Fund will continue to be monitored closely.
- Expenditures are within planned budgets YTD. The differences after eight months are timing between planned and actual expenditures plus encumbrances. Personnel costs have savings of \$3.7M or 3.9% is due to vacancies and timing between a position becoming vacant and filled. Management is working diligently to keep vacancies as low as possible.
- Contract construction cash expenditures in the State Highway Account for July February of this fiscal year are \$433.2M. Compared to the last three fiscal years through the first eight months of the year:
 - FY23= \$313.3M
 - FY22= \$279.9M
 - o FY21=\$306.2M

It is important to note that contract construction projects are funded from a total of five different funds. The State Highway Account, Strategic Initiatives Program Fund, Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund (TECM), TECM Bond Proceeds and GARVEE Bond Proceeds. The total construction expenditures for the first eight months from these funding sources was \$715.3M or \$182.1M higher than the highest point of the previous three years.

- FY23= \$533.2M
- FY22= \$368.6M
- FY21=\$376.0M

The balance of the long-term investments as of the end of February is \$181.9M. These funds are obligated against both construction projects and encumbrances. The long-term investments plus the cash balance (\$104.7M) totals \$286.6M.

Expenditures in the Strategic Initiatives Program Fund (GF Surplus), for the first eight months, are \$90.8M. This is the fund where the Governor's "Leading Idaho" transfer of \$181.7M completed in July was deposited. There are no additional receipts other than interest earned to date of \$1.0M based on the cash balance.



Deposits into the Transportation Expansion and Congestion Mitigation Fund of \$78.0M is the first eight months of the sales tax of 4.5%. Initial receipts into this fund for FY24 of \$37.3M is committed to debt service on the TECM Bonds. Expenditures in this fund for construction expenses on projects were \$19.8M.

As part of the CARES Act in 2020, ITD received a federal grant from the Federal Transit Administration of \$27.3M. The first three years of expenditures for this was \$14.3M. The expenses during the first eight of FY24 was \$3.2M, for a total expenditure of \$17.5M since the beginning of the grant.

Expenditures from the two active bond programs were \$151.1M for the TECM Capital Projects fund and \$25.7M for the GARVEE Capital Projects fund. Both programs are very active and advancing as planned.

The Governor's Office and the Division of Financial Management, working with department staff, act as clearinghouses to ensure a cohesive executive branch position on all legislative issues. While members are free to share their opinions on various topics, they shall not individually represent the advisory board to external stakeholders or legislators about a potential legislative issue until the department confirms alignment with the Governor's Office.

The Aeronautics Advisory Board will meet regularly and as necessary as determined by the Aeronautics Division Administrator. The Aeronautics Advisory Board Chairman, or his designee, will present annually to the Idaho Transportation Board a summary of its activities.

Background Information

In April 2021, the Transportation Board updated Board policy 4048 to reorganize the FAC to six members and a FAC Chair. The FAC consists of six District stakeholders who bring a statewide freight perspective from diverse stakeholder groups chartered with information sharing and working with ITD to incorporate freight interests into transportation planning and infrastructure improvement.

She brings a wealth of banking, economic development, and public service experience that will benefit the FAC as we look for more opportunities to serve the citizens of Idaho.

At the February 27, 2024 FAC meeting, the FAC unanimously voted to recommend Ms. Beseris' nomination as she would be a strong advocate and representative to serve District 5 for the term April 1, 2024 to December 31, 2027.

Background Information

Board Policy 4001 delegates authority to the Director or another designee to: approve routine engineering professional services agreements up to \$1,000,000, work task agreements for professional services up to \$500,000, cumulative work task agreements (one or more consultants) on a project up to \$1,500,000 and consultant two-year work task agreement total up to \$1,500,000. Any agreements greater than these thresholds must be authorized by the Board.

Professional service agreements, procured through ITD HQ Design Section, Consultant Services Group, follow three different processes based on the size of agreement. In all cases, professional services agreements are secured using a qualification based system rather than a competitive low bid basis used for typical construction contracts.

- Work task agreements less than \$100,000 are procured through a Direct Select process.
- Work task agreements between \$100,000 and \$500,000 are procured through a Request for Information (RFI) process which short lists consultants from a prequalified consultant registry referred to as the Term Agreement list.
- Professional service agreements greater than \$500,000 are solicited through a formal Request for Proposal (RFP).

The scale of these agreements are often anticipated and necessary due to the complexity and magnitude of the associated construction projects. In many instances, the original intent is to solicit the consultant service in phases allowing for greater flexibility for the Department, limited liability, and updating when a more refined scope of work is obtained. In other cases, such as for Construction Engineering and Inspection (CE&I) services one single agreement may be issued allowing for continuity of the inspector during the construction phase.

Project specific memorandums are attached and listed in the table below, for each project agreement seeking approval.

The purpose of this project is to take a closer look at the Huetter Bypass and explore more alternatives in the area through the PEL process to fulfill NEPA requirements. The Planning and Environmental Linkages (PEL) study will review and enhance previous study findings and document a determination of priority projects that can be efficiently vetted via subsequent National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) processes. The study area is defined by its west border as the Washington/Idaho state line, SH-53 is the north boundary, Government Way is the east boundary and I-90 is the south boundary.

In December 2021, through Request for Proposal (RFP), HDR Engineering, Inc. was selected to provide project development services. The district took a phased approach and issued agreements in phases based on the project development and department needs. The Phase 1 agreement was for gathering and evaluating past studies and totaled \$153,720. The Phase 2 agreement of \$117,061 included obtaining existing traffic data (counts, speeds, vehicle classifications, crash data, and origin/destination data). Phase 3 analyzed existing conditions, developed future No-Build travel demand forecasts, and analyzed future No-Build operational conditions to identify weaknesses and failing connections. This agreement of \$559,620 brought the total agreements written for the project to \$830,401.

In Phase 4, the consultant will develop alternatives, model and analyze them, screen out those that do not meet purpose and priority criteria, develop benefit/cost analyses for top alternatives that pass screening, engage the public as appropriate and respond to comments and questions, and document the actions as a PEL.

The Phase 4 agreement has been negotiated at \$1,446,583. These services will bring the total cost of services to be \$2,276,984.

Currently, there is \$3,000,000 scheduled for design services by consultants.

The purpose of this project is to upgrade and replace the existing substandard freeway interchange and ramps at the I-90/SH-41 Interchange to increase safety, capacity and promote economic opportunity. The partial clover-leaf interchange will be replaced with a single point urban interchange (SPUI) that will be safer, more efficient, and compatible with future expansion. Other major scope items include expansion of SH-41, reconstruction of the adjacent SH-41 and Mullan Intersection, and bike and pedestrian improvements.

In October 2017, through Request for Proposals (RFP), David Evans and Associates, Inc. was selected to perform design services. In April 2022, the board authorized the agreement amount for design and Engineer of Record services by David Evans and Associates, Inc. to \$9,500,000. The design and EOR agreements were negotiated at \$8,024,684 and \$1,481,540, respectively.

In May 2022, through Request for Proposals (RFP), David Evans and Associates, Inc. was selected to provide construction, engineering, and testing (CE&I) staff augmentation services to supplement the district staff that will be assigned to the project in construction. This project began in July 2022 and is expected to continue until spring 2026.

In June 2022, the board authorized the agreement amount for CE&I services by David Evans and Associates, Inc. to \$4,000,000, bringing the total authorized agreements to \$13,500,000. Since then, CE&I agreements have been written for 2022 and 2023 seasons with David Evans and Associates, Inc. in the amount of \$2,575,165, bringing the total agreements to \$12,081,389.

The negotiated cost of the CE&I agreement for 2024 season is \$2,980,584. This agreement will bring the total cost of CE&I services to be \$5,555,749 which is about 7% of the programmed construction funding. Total service agreements provided by David Evans and Associates, Inc. on this project equal \$15,061,973. This is approximately 18% of the programmed construction funding.

Currently, there is \$8,031,000 and \$5,500,000 scheduled for design and construction services by consultants, respectively. An additional \$1,600,000 will be obligated for the 2024 CE&I services from TECM program funds. No agreement will be written without enough obligated funding.

The purpose of this project is to improve safety and mobility on US-20 and through the Rexburg Interchanges (Exits 332, 333, and 337) by modifying the interchange to address safety, operations, geometrics, and capacity limitations. The updated interchanges at Exits 332 and 333 will replace the existing configurations on US-20 at University Blvd and SH-33 with Diverging Diamond Interchanges. These changes will help accommodate current and future transportation needs at these interchanges.

In August 2020, through Request for Proposal (RFP), Horrocks Engineers, Inc. was selected to provide design services for these interchange improvements. The project design services original total agreement amount was \$421,681.

In July 2021, additional services were negotiated and a supplemental agreement totaling \$257,485 was added to the total agreement amount. An additional supplemental for \$311,517 was added in November 2022. These supplementals brought the total agreement amount to \$990,683.

Engineer of Record services to include traffic and drainage construction support are necessary to support the completion of the project through construction. The negotiated cost of these services is \$90,711. These services will bring the total cost of services to approximately \$1,081,394. This is approximately 4% of the programmed construction funding.

Currently, there is \$1,295,000 scheduled for design services by consultants.
